#### Bill No. 23 of 1951.

## A BILL TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONSTITUTION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF HEALTH UNITS.

#### NOTE.

This Bill enacts a new Act to be known as "The Health Unit Act".

Any municipality that wishes to be included in a health unit may pass a resolution to this effect and submit it to the Minister. Upon the recommendation of the Minister, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may constitute any area a health unit and the unit is to be divided into wards. Provision is made for the subsequent alteration of the boundaries of any health unit or of any ward of a health unit.

The Bill provides that the health units will be administered by a board on which each ward is represented by one board member. The council of a municipality within which a ward is located is required to appoint a member of the council to be the member of the board representing that ward. Where a ward contains two or more municipalities, the council representing the greatest number of residents in the ward appoints one of its councillors to represent the ward. Each board member holds office during the pleasure of the council that appointed him until he ceases to be a councillor. The board elects one of its number as chairman and appoints a secretary-treasurer. The board is required to meet at least once every three months. The powers of the board to administer the health unit and to provide the health services are set out in detail in the Act.

The board of the health unit is authorized to employ staff, consisting of a medical officer, nurses, sanitary inspectors, etc. The number of persons employed is determined by the population of the health unit in the manner set out in the Act. Additional members of the staff may be employed but no grant is payable in respect of their salaries. Staff appointments, in respect of which grants are payable are subject to the approval of the Minister and the appointments are held during the pleasure of the board. Staff salaries are required to be in accordance with the salaries contained in a schedule recommended from time to time by the Provincial Government salary survey committee and approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council. A board may pay salaries in excess of those approved in the schedule but the excess salaries are not considered in calculating the amount of the grant or the statutory deductions under The Public Service Pension Act. The Public Service Pension Act is made applicable to the staff of a health unit.

The board is required to prepare a budget of its estimated expenditure for each year and to submit the same to the Minister for his approval.

The Department of Health pays sixty per cent of the cost of all equipment, the purchase of which is approved by the Department, sixty per cent of the approved salaries of the staff and sixty per cent of all other operating costs approved by the Minister. The contributing councils pay the balance in proportion to their respective populations served by the health unit. A copy of the annual financial statement is to be submitted to the Minister and the books and accounts of the board may be inspected at any time by the Provincial Auditor.

The Bill provides for the appointment of a director of health units by the provincial Department of Health who will assist and advise boards in carrying out their duties. The Lieutenant Governor in Council is given power to make regulations under the Act to facilitate its administration and the carrying out of its purposes.

Existing health units organized under *The Public Health Act* continue to operate under that Act until such time as they are reconstituted for operation under this Act by an order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council. Any health unit may be dis-established at any time by order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

The Bill does not in any way affect the responsibility of municipalities for their indigent sick residents and a section is included to make this clear.

The Bill comes into force on the day upon which it is assented to.

## An Act to Provide for the Constitution and Establishment of Health Units.

### (Assented to , 1951.)

**H**IS MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Alberta, enacts as follows:

## Short Title.

**1.** This Act may be cited as "The Health Unit Act".

#### Interpretation.

- 2. In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,— Interpreta-
  - (a) "board" means the board of the health unit ap- "board" pointed under the provisions of this Act;
  - (b) "contributing council" means the council of a muni- "contributing cipality any portion of which is included in a health unit;
  - (c) "council" means the council of a municipality, and "council" in the case of an improvement district or a special area, the Minister of Municipal Affairs or such person as he may designate;
  - (d) "Department" means the Department of Public "Depart-Health;
  - (e) "health unit" means an area of the Province that "health unit" has been established as a health unit under the provisions of this Act;
  - (f) "Minister" means the Minister of Health;
  - (g) "municipal Act" means, in relation to any particu- "municipal lar municipality, the Act under which the municipality is constituted and governed;
  - (h) "municipality" means a town, village, municipal "municipal district, improvement district, special area, and a city with a population not exceeding fifty thousand.

#### Organization.

**3.**—(1) Any municipality that wishes to be included in Inclusion of municipality whole or in part within a health unit may pass a resolution in health unit to that effect and submit the same to the Minister.

(2) Upon the recommendation of the Minister, the Lieu- Constitution tenant Governor in Council may constitute any area a health unit unit.

(3) The order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council constituting a health unit shall,—

(a) establish the boundaries thereof;

(b) divide the health unit into wards.

Alteration of boundaries

<sup>of</sup> **4.**—(1) The board, or any contributing council, may pass a resolution requesting the alteration of the boundaries of a health unit or of any ward of a health unit and may submit the same to the Minister.

(2) Upon the recommendation of the Minister, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may alter the boundaries of the health unit or of any ward of the health unit by adding land to or detaching land from the same at any time.

**6.**—(1) Where a ward is entirely within one municipality, the contributing council of that municipality shall appoint a member of the council to be the member of the board representing that ward.

(2) Where a ward contains all or part of two or more municipalities, the contributing council representing the greatest number of residents in the ward shall appoint a member of the council to be the member of the board representing that ward.

7.—(1) The board may pass a resolution providing for payment to the members thereof of a sum not exceeding eight dollars per day for each member for each meeting, and ten cents per mile for each mile necessarily travelled in coming to and returning from a meeting of the board.

(2) Every such resolution shall be submitted for the approval of the Minister.

**8.**—(1) The board, at its first meeting in each year, shall,—

(a) elect one of its number as chairman;

(b) appoint a secretary-treasurer.

#### The Staff.

10.—(1) The board may employ,—

- (a) a full-time medical officer for a population of twenty Health unit thousand or more;
- (b) a part-time medical officer for a population of less than twenty thousand;
- (c) a full-time nurse for each ten thousand of population within a town or city;
- (d) a full-time nurse for each six thousand of population outside a town or city;
- (e) a full-time sanitary inspector for each twenty thousand of population;
- (f) a part-time sanitary inspector for a population of less than twenty thousand;
- (g) a full-time stenographer-technician for each twenty thousand of population or major part thereof;
- (h) a full-time or part-time secretary-treasurer.

(2) The board may employ additional members of the staff in excess of those designated in subsection (1), but no grant shall be paid by the Department in respect of the salaries of the additional staff members.

**11.**—(1) The appointment of each member of the staff  $s_{taff}$ in respect of whom the Department will pay a grant is appointment subject to the approval of the Minister.

Application of The Public Service Pension Act

**13.**—(1) The Public Service Pension Act applies to the staff of a health unit employed under the provisions of this Act.

(2) Where a person is employed part-time by each of two or more health units and the total of such part-time employment by health units is equivalent to full-time continuous employment by one health unit such person shall be deemed to be an employee within the meaning of *The Public Service Pension Act* and statutory deductions shall be made in respect of the part of his salary that he receives from each health unit.

Pension deductions (3) The statutory deductions directed by section 5 of *The Public Service Pension Act* shall be made and paid into the General Revenue Fund by the board in lieu of the Provincial Treasurer at the times provided in the said section.

(4) On or before the last day of each month a contribution shall be made by the board of each health unit to the General Revenue Fund of an amount equivalent to the total amount contributed by the staff of the health unit in that month.

#### Financial Provisions.

Budget

**14.**—(1) The board shall prepare a budget of its estimated expenditure for each year.

(2) The budget shall be submitted to the Minister for his approval.

Expenses payable by Department 15. The Department shall pay to each health unit out of moneys appropriated for that purpose by the Legislature,—

- (a) sixty per cent of all the cost of equipment, the purchase of which is approved by the Department;
- (b) sixty per cent of the salaries approved under section 12 of each member of the staff appointed under section 10, subsection (1) whose appointment is approved by the Minister;
- (c) sixty per cent of all other operating costs that are approved by the Minister.

Expenses payable by contributing councils

**16.**—(1) The contributing councils shall pay the balance of the expenses of the health unit.

• (2) Each contributing council shall pay the proportion of the expenses that its population served by the health unit bears to the total population served by the health unit.

(3) Population figures shall be based on the latest quinquennial census.

Financial statement

**17.**—(1) The board shall prepare a financial statement at the end of each year and shall forward a copy of the same to the Minister.

(2) The books and accounts of the board may be inspected Inspection of books and at any time by the Provincial Auditor. accounts

#### General Provisions.

18. Subject to The Public Service Act, 1947, the Minister Appointment may appoint a director of health units to assist and advise of director of health unit the boards in the carrying out of their duties.

**19.**—(1) The Lieutenant Governor in Council may make Regulations such regulations as may be considered necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act.

(2) Without restricting the generality of the foregoing, Lieutenant the Lieutenant Governor in Council may make regulations,-

- (a) governing the handling of funds by health units, the make regulacollection of contributions due from municipalities, governing and the collection of accounts outstanding:
- (b) governing the conditions of employment of the governing staff:
- (c) requiring the submission of annual and quarterly requiring reports and other reports; and
- (d) providing for such other matters and things not to facilitate inconsistent with this Act, as are deemed necessary tration to facilitate its administration and to enable the proper carrying out of its purposes.

20.-(1) Each existing health unit organized under The Reconstitu-Public Health Act shall continue to operate under that Act existing until such time as it can be reconstituted for operation under health unit this Act by an order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

(2) An order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council under subsection (1),—

- (a) may provide for any matter or thing deemed necessary or advisable to provide for or facilitate the reconstitution of an existing health unit to operate in compliance with this Act;
- (b) shall designate the effective date upon which the health unit shall cease to operate under the provisions of The Public Health Act and shall commence to operate under the provisions of this Act.
