This being the First Day of the Third Session of the Sixteenth Legislative Assembly of the Province of Alberta, for the despatch of business pursuant to a Proclamation of His Honour the Honourable J. W. Grant MacEwan, Lieutenant Governor, dated the sixth day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and sixty nine.

The Clerk of the Legislative Assembly read the Proclamation as follows:

Mr. Speaker entered the Assembly and took the Chair.

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor entered the Assembly and took his seat on the Throne.

His Honour then read the following Speech from the Throne:

#### SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE  
LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

I have the honour to welcome you to the third session of the Sixteenth Legislature of the Province of Alberta, and to present on behalf of my Government various matters which it wishes to lay before you.

It was with deep regret that we learned of the untimely death of Mr. William Switzer who served his constituency of Jasper-Edson with distinction for a number of years. We welcome his successor Mr. Dowling who now will carry the responsibility for representing the people in his constituency.

The decade of the 1970's will present a new challenge and great opportunities for Albertans. We are entering a new phase of development which holds great promise and potential. We look forward to a better life for all Albertans.

#### THEME FOR THE SEVENTIES

During the past year, my Government has been planning and preparing programs for the 1970's directed toward improvement of the environment wherein creativity and freedom are broadened and strengthened, and where the opportunities, values, potentialities and liberties of individual Albertans remain the first concern and the major objective of public policy. The new decade will be one in which we

accept the challenge of rapidly changing conditions. My Government is committed to social and economic innovations which will bring social advances to the people of Alberta.

In the decade ahead, my Government will be even more open to innovation, to reorganization, and to acting on both the problems and the opportunities of urbanization. Recognizing the need for improved citizen-government communication, measures will be undertaken to increase and expand communication channels. My Government appreciates the need to ensure a proper and healthy environment.

My Government will encourage increased participation in, and knowledge about, public affairs. My Government recognizes that our problems require the active efforts, the resourcefulness, and the ingenuity of the private sector. This will require co-operative efforts to develop the trading, exploration, investment and manufacturing aspects of our economy.

#### FEDERAL-PROVINCIAL RELATIONS

My Government recognizes the need for improved and more formal liaison between the Federal Government and the Provincial Government. The effectiveness of maintaining an acceptable balance in our federation between the Provinces and the Government of Canada relates to the effectiveness of the machinery for co-operation between governments. My Government has vigorously established a strong "case for the west" and will continue to press forward in Federal-Provincial relationships which will fully recognize the just rights, aspirations, and prerogatives of Alberta people.

To this end my Government will urge that fiscal arrangements between the Federal and Provincial Governments be revised to permit the Province to utilize the major portion of the personal income tax field, to retain a portion of the corporation income tax field, and to withdraw from shared cost programs with the Government of Canada. Such revision would extend the Provincial Government a greater measure of flexibility in designing and developing policies and programs which are their constitutional responsibility.

In this connection my Government is preparing a comprehensive submission to the Government of Canada on the proposals contained in the White Paper on Tax Reform issued last November, which will emphasize the need for a fair and equitable income tax system that will encourage economic expansion and full scale development of natural resources.

#### URBAN LIFE

To build our cities with attention to human needs, aesthetic sensibilities, and environmental concerns, as well as economic considerations, will be an objective of my Government. To keep pace with accelerated urbanization, consultation between my Government and the mayors of the ten cities have begun for the purpose of formulating fundamental terms upon which to commission an Urban Life Study.

A new Alberta Housing Act will be presented for your approval which will establish the Alberta Housing Corporation as a Crown Corporation. You will be asked to broaden its powers to enable it to respond more directly to housing needs in local communities and to provide the Corporation with more flexibility in the providing of funds for housing purposes.

Amendments to the Municipal Government Act will be proposed to meet requests of the Urban and Rural Municipal Associations including a provision that will permit a municipality to make land available at less than market value for housing purposes.

The Urban Transportation Act will be introduced in this Session. This will be the first Bill of its kind in Canada. Its acceptance will spur the development of ultra-modern transportation systems in our cities.

#### AGRICULTURE

Agriculture continues to hold an important place in the economy of Alberta. To assist in meeting the present situation facing farmers emphasis will be directed toward participating directly in marketing, advocating stable diversification policies based on factual data, and encouraging greater production for specialized markets.

To meet an anticipated greater demand for livestock products, my Government is continuing efforts to increase production.

In keeping with my Government's desire to improve and develop our water resources, and in recognition of the importance of conservation, a revised Water Resources Act will be presented.

#### SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

Because of many circumstances, some of our citizens have been placed at a disadvantage in coping with our complex society. My Government will expand a recently completed and highly successful employment opportunities project. Legislation will be proposed to replace the Public Welfare Act to enable my Government to undertake a progressive program of employment opportunities and to emphasize the concepts of development and income security. A number of recommendations contained in the Alberta Penology Study report have been implemented or are in the process of implementation. These include the establishment of youth hostels, recruitment of employees of Indian ancestry as probation officers and court workers, the study of recreational requirements within our penal system, new sites for remand centres, and new approaches to problems dealing with alcohol.

Legislation will also be presented transferring the responsibility for juvenile offenders from the Department of the Attorney General to the Department of Social Development. This will bring two areas of child neglect and delinquency, which have many common problems, under one administration.

A new approach to senior citizens housing will re-emphasize the senior citizens home building program.

## HEALTH SERVICES

Provincial health programs and services will be re-examined with a view to integrating a number of programs into the regular delivery system. The objective will be a system designed to ensure human development on an individual basis. The Alberta Health Care Insurance program is now functioning within the terms of legislation enacted by this Assembly during the last Session. Experience of the past seven months has resulted in the preparation of a number of changes to the program which will improve our health plan to make it the finest in Canada.

In the main, the changes will reflect the general public desire for a total health care insurance package. The basic premium will become a health services premium, encompassing both physician and hospital services with drug insurance available on an option basis. In addition, premium subsidies will be reconstructed to reflect more accurately the various financial capabilities of our lower income families.

Changes will also be made enabling those who object in principle to publicly financed health services to exempt themselves from both the benefits of the program and payment of the premium.

In view of the comparatively high cost of hospital insurance for our low income and elderly citizens in particular, the direct daily patient charge for hospital services will be eliminated. With the incorporation of hospital services into the basic health premium applicable to all citizens, the four mill levy on property assessment will also be eliminated.

My Government has accepted the philosophy of decentralization and community based mental health services as advocated in the Blair Report. Legislative amendments reflecting that policy will be introduced for your consideration.

In other fields of public health, you will be asked to consider legislation for the establishment of a commission on alcohol and drug abuse. The growing incidence of drug abuse in our society provides ample evidence for the need for a new and imaginative approach which can be more readily implemented through a commission armed with broad and flexible authority.

## EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

During the past year my Government carried out a review of the Province's educational system. A Royal Commission on Education is dealing with the future needs of education in Alberta. Studies were conducted into the cost of school building and the cost of financing bus transportation, and the efficiency and cost of the foundation program.

The question of creating a fourth university to serve the needs of the students in the northern half of the Province has now been resolved after consultation. My Government will commence planning



an independent fourth university in the Edmonton area specializing in the social sciences, humanities and education.

A number of other problems were also studied including the provision of better educational services to native people and to disadvantaged children in our urban areas. The development of a Province-wide program to increase employment opportunities for students in post-secondary institutions will be undertaken.

Action will be taken to impose tighter controls on educational spending.

The production of a film on drug misuse will be commissioned. Pre-school education for disadvantaged youngsters in Edmonton and Calgary will be developed. New regulations will enable urban school boards to renovate inadequate schools in downtown areas.

My Government will reorganize the School Foundation Plan Fund to reflect more accurately my Government's commitment to fiscal restraint and the provision of an adequate standard of education for all young people in the Province.

A major revision of the School Act will be presented for your consideration.

#### YOUTH, CULTURE AND RECREATION

Recognizing the changes in our living habits, in our environment, and in our style of living, my Government intends to review and analyze youth, cultural, and recreational programs. Revitalized programs will be designed to meet the increasing desire of Albertans to participate in the arts and cultural development, and in meaningful recreational and leisure activities.

#### RESEARCH AND REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Reports will be given on the activities of the Alberta Human Resources Research Council, and the Alberta Human Resources Development Authority. You will be asked to consider detailed reports on regional development plans.

#### CONSERVATION

Albertans have a heritage of a beautiful and bountiful province. Measures to assure the conservation of our pure air, productive soil and clean water will be presented for your consideration.

You will be asked to approve legislation establishing an Environmental Conservation Authority armed with broad investigative powers to help preserve a healthy environment.

You will also be asked to approve amendments that will provide exemption from assessment and taxation of land or improvements used exclusively for abatement of water, soil or air pollution provided the owner meets the standards required by the Provincial Board of Health.

## INDUSTRY AND MARKETING

New programs will be created during the next year to encourage awareness of the advantages of the Province of Alberta. These programs will actively promote interest in industry, tourism and trade. Increased and expanded industrial development and business oriented trade missions will be operated. My Government intends to broaden our trade market and encourage both exploration and investment.

In order to ensure maximum exploration of our natural resources, my Government will continue to use every avenue to enhance our market position. This includes Government representations to the National Energy Board, careful check on transportation facilities, and maximum liaison with producers and all levels of government.

Long range plans are now materializing for the development and the delivery of our coal. Present information indicates a tremendous increase in the markets for Alberta coal.

Mineral and overall resources development has never looked better for the Province of Alberta.

## OTHER MEASURES

In addition to the foregoing, my Government will also propose for your consideration routine measures and amendments submitted by the various departments for your consideration.

These will include amendments in almost all departments, including revision of the Forest Act and the Game Act, and amendments to the Public Land Act. Important amendments to the Labour Act, the Fire Act, and the Police Act, will be presented for your consideration.

My Government will also ask you to give consideration to amendments to the Alberta Heritage Act and the Companies Act.

A new driving demerit point system will also be introduced to assist in a planned program to reduce highway accidents and fatalities.

Legislative Committees appointed at the last session will present their reports.

## CONCLUSION

My Ministers will report on the activities of their Departments.

In summary, the major concerns of my Government include the question of Federal-Provincial relations and the position of Alberta within Confederation; the changing quality of life within Alberta and the new needs and opportunities within our urban centres; a continued emphasis on the development of new and exciting programs and policies to ensure the development of the great human potential of our Province; the encouraging and fostering of continued growth and productivity; the creation of new opportunities for the Alberta economy; and the reorganization and development of departments and programs to offer efficient and contemporary services to the people of Alberta.

The measures proposed, and the objectives of the Government, reflect the desire of Albertans to have programs to satisfy the needs and meet the aspirations of our citizens.

Members of the Legislative Assembly: during the Session you will be asked to grant the necessary funds for the services and expenditures authorized by the Legislature.

The public accounts for the last fiscal year and the Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the ensuing year will be presented for your most careful scrutiny.

I leave you now to the business of the session, confident that you will apply yourselves to your responsibilities in a manner which will redound to the best interest of all the citizens of this Province.

I pray that Divine Providence will guide and direct your deliberations.

Answer:

The Government did not make representation to the City of Grande Prairie. The Mayor of Grande Prairie asked for an appointment to discuss the proposed rate increase. We do not make public presentations that organizations submit to the Government. If they so wish, the submissions are released by those making the presentation. The Government called the Power Companies in to ascertain that we all had the same understanding as to rates for rural areas and if the companies would review their requirements for capital in the future so that the rate increase could be deferred, if possible. No representation was made to the Public Utilities Board.

Answer 1.

Seven.

Question 2.

Answer 2.

Of the 38 gas co-ops formed to the end of 1969, 27 have established gas distribution systems supplying 2,570 members. In 1969 the utility companies supplied gas to 1,583 consumers who were not co-op members. Utility company figures for previous years for rural gas consumers not presently available.

Question 3.

Has the Government yet decided to delineate areas that must be served?

Answer 3.

No.

How many fish will be required for a stocking program in Alberta in 1970?

Answer 1.

3<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> million to 4 million of which 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> million will be rainbow fingerlings, 500,000 will be rainbow yearlings and the remainder will include smaller numbers of brook trout, lake trout, coho salmon and kokanee salmon.

In addition we hope to receive approximately 1,000,000 walleye (pickerel) eyed eggs from the Province of Saskatchewan. These will be stocked as eyed eggs in Alberta lakes.

Question 2.

Where are these fish coming from and what is the cost to the Provincial Government?

Answer 2.

We purchase trout, kokanee and coho salmon eggs from several sources in Washington, Oregon and Montana, and obtain by way of trade, some lake trout eggs from the Province of Saskatchewan. The cost of the eggs for 1970 will be approximately \$8,800.00. The eggs are hatched and the young fish are reared to the size required for stocking at our fish hatchery in Calgary and our rearing station at Caroline, Alberta.

It is estimated that a saving of \$128,000.00 per year is realized by the fish cultural methods we employ as compared with the purchase of all fish required from outside sources.

In 1970 a special arrangement has been made with several Fish and Game groups in Southern Alberta to purchase trout fingerlings to stock Tyrell's lake. The cost of this project to the government will be \$22,500.00, with a like sum to be paid by the sportsmen of southern Alberta. We were not able to include the stocking of this lake in our own program due to the limitations of our fish hatchery, thus the reason for entering into an agreement with the Southern Alberta Fish and Game Clubs for the purchase of trout fingerlings from outside sources.

Question 1:

What is the total amount of land under lease or other agreement with North West Pulp and Power, indicating the location and size of each such lease or agreement.

Answer:

The total land area under agreement to North Western Pulp & Power is 6,300 square miles, of which 3,300 square miles is contingent upon expansion commencing January 1, 1971. There is only one agreement involved, the first agreement signed on June 9, 1951, having been amended several times to develop the present agreement which was signed on August 30, 1968.

## Question 2:

How much of this land under lease or other agreement has been cleared, indicating the locations of such clearing for pulp purposes at any time since North West Pulp and Power began its operation in Hinton and the future plans for pulp gathering indicating the locations involved.

## Answer:

A total of 100,419 acres had been cut over by the Company to December 31, 1968, with an additional 9,000 acres estimated cut in 1969. Final figures for the year ending December 31, 1969, are not yet available.

The compartment maps show the location of future cutting. The present cutting method calls for removal of the timber in the first cycle compartments over a twenty year period, followed by removal of the timber in the second cycle compartments over the next 20 years, followed in turn by the third and fourth cycle compartments. In the 81st year operations will commence again in the regenerated stands in the first cycle compartments.

Within each compartment alternate blocks are cut, leaving the intervening reserve blocks for removal ten years later. The cutting pattern used is exemplified by the accompanying maps for Compartments Athabasca XIV and Athabasca XVI.

Because of slow growth rates evident in coniferous (spruce and pine) regeneration on the agreement area, the Department is considering an amendment to the past procedure, whereby reserve or leave blocks will be removed twenty years after the original cut, thereby providing more time for the growth of coniferous regeneration on the cut-over areas prior to removal of the surrounding timber.

Implementation of this change will mean that the first and second cycle compartments will be combined, as will the third and fourth, thereby developing forty year cutting cycle compartments, rather than twenty year cutting cycle compartments as at present.

## Question 1:

Has construction commenced on a building for the manufacture of picnic tables and chairs for use in the Provincial Government camping and picnic areas, and if so where is the building located and when will manufacture commence?

## Answer:

Yes. Workshop is 25% completed. It is located in the Bonaventure Industrial Subdivision at 146 Street and 130 Avenue.

The estimated time for completion of contract is July 6, 1970, when machinery and materials from two temporary locations will be



moved to new facility for manufacturing a variety of movable buildings, table-bench combinations, signs and other articles required in provincial parks and historic sites. The workshop is also used for repair of equipment.

Question 2:

Did the Minister and his Department investigate the possibility of locating this manufacturing concern in an area of the Province outside of the urban areas — where raw materials are readily available and if this investigation was carried out what were the findings of this investigation?

Answer:

Yes. The reasons for not locating a workshop in a location outside an urban centre are as follows:

1. Costs of materials increase when there is an increase in distance from the main suppliers.
2. Permanent staff would be affected adversely if their duties removed them from homes either owned or rented in an urban centre.
3. Government responsibility to provide accommodation away from an urban centre where most civil servants have homes could prove costly and could affect the desire of qualified men to continue employment with Parks.
4. A centrally located supply depot such as the one under construction will serve all of the province much more efficiently than smaller depots spread over the province.
5. The workshop building in Edmonton is also the central stock-room for the multitude of items required by the workshop manufacturing process and for individual parks. The suppliers are almost without exception located in the city.

ON MOTIONS OTHER THAN GOVERNMENT MOTIONS:

Moved by Dr. Horner, Seconded by Mr. Lougheed.

WHEREAS there exists in Alberta, a critical decline in net farm income affecting the total economy and prosperity of Albertans;

AND WHEREAS such decline in net farm income arises primarily from difficulties in marketing the grain produced on Alberta farms;

AND WHEREAS the major grain products are marketed by The Canadian Wheat Board, pursuant to the provisions of The Canadian Wheat Board Act;

AND WHEREAS the Canadian Wheat Board's jurisdiction essentially relates to only the Provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, and not to the other seven Canadian provinces;

AND WHEREAS the Alberta Government should clearly be more actively involved in the marketing of our grain products;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Legislature recommend to the Government that:

1. Negotiations be undertaken forthwith with the Federal Government to revise The Canadian Wheat Board Act —
  - a) by adding a provision to the effect that any orders to the Wheat Board by the Federal Government be made only after full consultation with the Provincial Governments involved.
  - b) by adding a section to the effect that the Provincial Governments of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba shall submit annual recommendations to the Governor-in-Council regarding the operations of the Board and recommendations concurred in by all three Provincial Governments and by the Governor-in-Council shall forthwith be transmitted into orders.
2. That the Provincial Government attempt to obtain support for such negotiations from the Provincial Governments of Saskatchewan and Manitoba.
3. That the direction and nature of the negotiations referred to in paragraphs 1. and 2. above be made after full consultation with farm producing, marketing and other agricultural organizations in operation, or about to be in operation, in this Province.
4. That in addition, the Alberta Government negotiate with the Federal Government to attempt to establish an adequate participation by the Alberta Government in the Canada Grains Council, and in any other Federal Government agencies charged with the responsibility for grain marketing.

Concerning the report of the Chairman of the Public Accounts Committee respecting fuel oil tax, tabled on April 2nd, the Speaker addressed the House as follows:

It is the duty of the Public Accounts Committee to undertake an examination of government expenditures for the preceding fiscal year to ensure that the sums of money voted to the Government by the Legislature have not been exceeded or used for purposes other than those agreed to by the Legislature.

Where exceptions occur — as in the cases of Special Warrants, Departmental Overdrafts, Transfers of Funds — the Committee, on behalf of the Legislature, must satisfy itself that such transactions were justifiable and necessary.

With such facts placed before it, the Committee will examine the financial performance of the administration and report to the Legislature such matters as it feels should come to the attention of the House.

The Report tabled yesterday by the Chairman of the Public Accounts Committee does not fall within these terms of reference. The function of the Public Accounts Committee has been described by the parliamentarian Sidney Webb as a post mortem. The dead cannot be brought back to life but it may help to prevent further "murders". In ruling the Report out of order, I will presume that it is intended to prevent further murders, but must ask the Committee to confine itself to the post mortem.

If the Committee feels that a government program is being inefficiently or uneconomically administered, it certainly has the duty of bringing this to the attention of the House. It exceeds its authority, however, when instead of reporting a state of affairs that exists in the financial administration of the government, it recommends alternative fiscal policies to the government.

As the report tabled by the Chairman of the Standing Committee on Public Accounts exceeds the authority of that Committee, I must therefore rule it out of order.

- (1) total relief for homeowners attaining the age of 65 from that portion of property tax used to finance education costs;
- (2) the establishment of a system of rental premium assistance for certain fixed-income pensioners who might apply and qualify for such aid;
- (3) change of regulation regarding the acquisition of drivers' licenses which impose discriminatory financial burdens on older drivers;
- (4) an accelerated and continuing program of construction of housing for senior citizens across the province;
- (5) an accelerated and continuing program of construction of nursing homes across the province;
- (6) the formation of Advisory Councils of Retired Citizens throughout the Province, based on expertise and experience, for the purpose of assisting in finding solutions to various problems within Alberta.

Moved by Mr. Simpson, seconded by Mr. Lamothe, that the motion be amended by striking out all words after the word "that" in the effective part of the resolution and substituting the following:

"This Assembly commend the Government for its program of assistance to senior citizens of the province

- (a) in alleviating the tax burden of senior citizens through the extra \$50.00 homeowner tax discount,
- (b) in providing the most extensive program of senior citizen housing and nursing homes to be found anywhere in Canada,
- (c) in the plans for continuing the expansion of these programs,
- (d) in the changes in health care premiums and increased subsidies for people of low income;
- (e) in working co-operatively with voluntary groups and agencies whose objective is concern for senior citizens such as the Alberta Council for Aging and Preventive Social Service Advisory Committees.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Government be urged to consider additional ways of assisting senior citizens on fixed incomes to enjoy the opportunities which abound in Alberta for enjoyment of their retirement years."

MR. SPEAKER:

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY  
OF ALBERTA:

In bringing to a close this Third Session of the Sixteenth Legislative Assembly, I desire to express my appreciation of the earnest and diligent manner in which you have applied yourselves to your public duties.
