This being the First Day of the First Session of the Seventeenth Legislative Assembly of the Province of Alberta, for the despatch of business pursuant to a Proclamation of His Honour the Honourable J. W. Grant MacEwan, Lieutenant Governor, dated the seventh day of December, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and seventy-one;

The Clerk of the Legislative Assembly read the Proclamation as follows:

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient for certain causes and considerations to convene the Legislative Assembly of Our Province of Alberta, WE DO WILL that you and each of you, and all others in this behalf interested, on THURSDAY, the SECOND day of MARCH, One Thousand, Nine

Hundred and Seventy-two, at the hour of THREE o'clock in the afternoon, at Our City of Edmonton, personally be and appear for the despatch of business, to treat, act, do and conclude upon those things which, in the Legislature of Alberta, by the Common Council of Our said Province may, by the favour of God, be ordained.

HEREIN FAIL NOT

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Our Province to be hereunto affixed.

The members having been duly sworn in by His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor and having subscribed to the Roll containing the Oath, took their seats.

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor entered the assembly and took his seat on the Throne.

The Provincial Secretary then said:

"I am commanded by His Honour, the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor to inform you that he does not see fit to declare the causes of the summoning of the present Legislature of this Province until a Speaker of this Assembly shall have been chosen according to law; but today at the hour of 3:30 His Honour will declare the causes of the calling of this Legislature.

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Assembly.

The Premier, the Honourable Peter Lougheed, addressing the Clerk, nominated Gerard Amerongen, Member of the Electoral Division of Edmonton Meadowlark, to take the chair of this Assembly as Speaker seconded by the Leader of the Opposition. Mr. Strom.

The Clerk, having asked if any Honourable Member had another name to propose is Speaker, and no other name being proposed, the Clerk of the Assembly then declared "that Gerard Amerongen, Honourable Member for Edmonton Meadowlark, is duly appointed Speaker of this Legislative Assembly according to law."

The Speaker retired, and re-entered the Assembly, robed, accompanied by his Mover and Seconder, and standing on the

upper step of the dais, thanked the Assembly for the honour conferred upon him with the following speech:

"HONOURABLE MEMBERS:

In acknowledging the office and trust you have just conferred on me, my first word must be about my constituents. This Assembly has honoured them by honouring me, their representative.

The approval of my constituents is making it possible for me to serve as an elected representative and to make their wishes and needs effectively known to the government and its agencies and ministers — as I have been doing and will most certainly continue to do.

And now in appointing me to be the presiding officer of this Assembly, you, my colleagues, have given me an extended field of service.

I ask both sides of the House for forbearance if at times I appear to lose my head. In the long history of the Speakership several have lost theirs — and it is recorded that at least one died in battle — albeit outside the House.

From the Mother of Parliaments this House has inherited an honourable tradition. So it is that the distinctive garb and position of the Speaker, as well as the rules of the Assembly belong to the Assembly and not to the Speaker.

I ask for the assistance of all of my colleagues here, both members and ministers so that I may continue to do my work as an elected representative as well as the additional duties you have imposed on me today.

I look forward to working in and with this Assembly and all its members wheresoever their desks may be, for the important purposes for which we have all been elected by our province."

The Speaker then took his seat and the Mace was placed in the table by the Sergeant-at-arms.

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor returned to the Assembly and took his seat on the Throne.

The Speaker then said:

"May it please Your Honour, the Legislative Assembly have elected me as their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If in the performance of those duties I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me and not to the Assembly, whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their Queen and Country, hereby claim all their endowed rights and privileges, especially, that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to your person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from you the most favourable consideration."

The Provincial Secretary then said:

"I am commanded by His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the Assembly to Her Majesty's person and Government and not doubting that their proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper and prudence he grants and upon all occasions will recognize and allow their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you that the Assembly shall have ready access to His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor upon all suitable occasions and all their proceedings as well as their work and actions will constantly receive from him the most favourable consideration."

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then read the following Speech from the Throne:

"MR. SPEAKER AND THE MEMBERS OF THE
LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

I have the honour to welcome you to the First Session of the 17th Legislature of the Province of Alberta.

In many ways, this event is unique and historic. The privilege of accepting office came to my government on September 10th, 1971, marking the first Progressive Conservative administration in the history of Alberta, and the first new government in thirty-six years.

After calling on Albertans to recognize the many contributions of the previous administration in the years since 1935, my government set about the task of charting a new course for "Alberta in the Seventies".

New programs, policy changes, innovations and reforms will be implemented. Existing programs that are sound and have proved their worth will be continued. Change will be viewed - not with fear and apprehension - but with optimism, with a sense of challenge and of opportunities to be grasped.

Social reform will be considered in the light of employment opportunities. Employment and industrial growth will be considered in the light of conservation of our environment. All will be blended into a goal seeking fulfillment and a rewarding quality of life for all our citizens. My government is determined to pursue excellence in every endeavour.

It is a major goal of my government to reduce bureaucratic routine and red tape. New job creation and expansion of the private sector will be emphasized.

To be responsible, yet seek reform; to be contemporary and progressive without forgetting the lessons of experience; to allow the full exercise of free initiative, combined with compassion for the unfortunate; these are the broad goals of my government in the exciting years ahead.

OPEN GOVERNMENT

My government is committed to the principle of open government; providing citizens with easier access to their Legislature and its deliberations. To this end:

1. A resolution to provide a continuous and easily available written record of the business proceedings of the Assembly will be introduced. Similar to the "Hansard" publication in other jurisdictions, this written record of proceedings will enable Albertans to receive, if they so desire, an accurate, up-to-date report on the manner in which issues affecting people in all walks of life and in all parts of the province are being dealt with by their M.L.A.'s.

2. A resolution to open the public business of the Legislature to the television and radio media will be put forward. By this means Alberta citizens should gain additional audio and visual information as to the work their elected Legislators are doing, and should be able to better understand and add their voices to the discussion of issues that are being debated and considered.

3. The "open government" concept will also be fostered by the decision of my government to call the Legislative Assembly into Session twice a year, beginning in this year, 1972. The addition of Fall Sittings will make my government more frequently accountable to the people for its decisions and policies. In addition, this reform will enable the expanding public business of the province to be handled more efficiently and expeditiously. Emerging problems and contemporary issues that call for debate should then receive greater public scrutiny, with less delay than has been the case in the past. Laws needing amendment will be changed more quickly, to serve faster and more effectively the needs of Alberta.

4. The status and responsibilities of M.L.A.'s, as representatives of the people in their constituencies, will be substantially increased. To accomplish this, two specific steps will be taken:

- (a) A resolution will be introduced to assure that all Members of the Legislative Assembly will have a reasonable opportunity to debate Public Bills (other than Government Bills) proposed and introduced by them in response to requests by their constituents and by other Albertans;
- (b) Expanded use of Special Legislative Committees will give Members of the Assembly new opportunities to carry out fact-finding missions and assure that elected representatives, rather than appointed individuals, may consider new and better policies and legislation.

5. The position and significance of Government M.L.A.'s who are not Members of the Executive Council will be recognized by a very significant innovation: - the introduction by, and responsibility of, such Government M.L.A.'s for certain Government Bills which do not contain budgetary obligations.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEES

To ensure that objective, non-partisan scrutiny is given to the public accounts, my government will propose that a Member of the Opposition be appointed Chairman of the Committee on Public Accounts.

The formation of six Special Legislative Committees will be proposed in order that issues and problems of contemporary concern receive detailed study, and in order to ensure that Alberta citizens are provided an opportunity to make submissions directly to elected Legislators. These committees will suggest policy alternatives after considering the following areas of public concern:

- (a) The desirability of limitations, if any, upon foreign investment.
- (b) Alternatives to The Communal Property Act.
- (c) The necessity for any form of censorship in Alberta.
- (d) Improvements in The Elections Act.
- (e) Legislative changes, if any, in laws governing professions and occupations.
- (f) Improvements in crop insurance programs.

NATURAL RESOURCES

The question of the amount and the method of calculation of natural resource revenue accruing to the people of Alberta, through their government, is of major importance to Albertans in the years ahead. During the Session, to ensure that citizens and Members of the Assembly are given an opportunity to assess the strengths and weaknesses of arguments advanced, this subject will be referred to the Standing Committee on Public Affairs. To the extent that the business of the House permits, the points of view of individuals and organized groups will be presented publicly and considered - before this critical decision is made.

REORGANIZATION

My government has made a number of major changes in organization to improve the effectiveness of its operations, in accordance with contemporary demands. Legislative ratification for these changes will be requested. These changes include:

1. The establishment of a new Department of Federal and Inter-governmental Affairs to assure that the Alberta Government's relationships with the Federal Government and with other Provincial Governments are improved and are effectively coordinated as between the various provincial departments. The rapidly escalating extent and variety of Federal/Provincial cost sharing agreements will be a major responsibility of this new department.

2. A new Department of Advanced Education, responsible for all educational programs in vocational and technical institutions, colleges and universities. The division of the former Department of Education into two distinct portfolios reflects

my government's concern that adequate ministerial attention be given to all educational activities in the province and full recognition be given to the diverse elements comprising these various educational activities. A Standing Committee of the Executive Council consisting of the Ministers of Education, Advanced Education, and Manpower and Labour has been created to assure effective coordination.

3. The former Department of Labour will be changed significantly into an expanded Department of Manpower and Labour, having responsibility for interdepartmental programmes, and will relate more closely the diverse capability of the Alberta labour force to the anticipated skill requirements of the province. With regard to employment programs, the Minister is currently chairing the successful interdepartmental Priorities Employment Program, (PEP), which is aiding in strengthening the winter employment situation in this province. My government intends to assure that in the future there is adequate advance planning for seasonal employment programs in order to avoid the reduced effectiveness of crash programs.

4. The Department of Industry will take over responsibility for the transportation sector of government research, in recognition of the key relationship between industrial development, freight rates, and transportation policies.

5. A Department of Telephones and Utilities is being created to assure that one Minister of the Executive Council has overall supervision of the services of essential utilities which affect the daily lives of every Albertan.

6. Among the new cabinet committees is a Cabinet Committee on Metropolitan Affairs to work in conjunction with the administrations of the cities of Edmonton and Calgary to attempt to offset some of the problems and difficulties apparent in metropolitan centres in North America. The committee consists of six Members of the Executive Council.

7. In addition to their broader obligations, the Ministers Without Portfolio have been assigned specific areas of responsibility in health care, tourism, rural development and northern development and native affairs.

8. In keeping with my government's position that all Government Members, within and without the Executive Council, share responsibility for policy formulation and response to the changing needs and requirements of the people, five major task forces of Government M.L.A.'s have been established to delve into five critical areas and recommend specific new directions for government policy.

IMMEDIATE PROGRAM PRIORITIES

In accordance with its undertaking to declare its priorities, my government confirms that it is committed to five areas of major priority action during Phase I of its administration. These immediate program priorities are:

1. Protection of human rights.

2. The difficult circumstances of many of our senior citizens,
3. The pressures on maintaining the family farm and problems associated with the marketing of agricultural produce.
4. The needed facilities and support for handicapped child
5. The overdue required reforms in mental health treatment and prevention.

My government's specific responses to these immediate program priorities involve:

(a) *Protection of human rights*

My government has as its primary concern the protection of individual human rights, both the rights of individuals in relation to the power of the state and the rights of individuals as between themselves. Therefore, at the outset of this Session my government intends to introduce The Alberta Bill of Rights, to be the paramount legislation of the province. This Bill will be similar to the Canadian Bill of Rights, within provincial jurisdiction, and will involve the areas of protection of individual rights from the encroachment of the state. Subsequently, an Individual Rights Protection Act will be introduced, to replace the former Human Rights Act, which will strengthen the protection of the individual from discrimination by other citizens as a result of race, creed, colour, religion, national origin, sex or age. These items of legislation will be supplemented by The Confidentiality of Public Documents Act to assure the protection of individual citizens in the intended disclosure by government representatives of an individual's private documents without the consent of the individual. In addition, the office of the Ombudsman and its independence from the Government will be strengthened by amending The Ombudsman Act. Further, it will be proposed that, The Sexual Sterilization Act, which in the view of my government offends basic human rights be repealed.

(b) *Senior Citizens*

Ratification will be requested of the action taken on January 1st, 1972, of relieving citizens 18 years or over and their dependants from the burden of Medicare premiums, drug costs and optional health services. Over 158,000 Albertans benefitted directly from this major policy change. In my government's view our senior citizens are usually trapped on fixed pension incomes with a very tight budget, and in these inflationary times deserve special consideration. One must bear in mind their contribution to Alberta's progress, over many years. In addition, there will be an amendment to The Highway Traffic Act to confirm that citizens of 70 years or over will not hereafter be obliged to take annual drivers' tests, if they have had a safe driving record and can provide the required health certificates. Other special programs to Improve the quality of life of our senior citizens will be announced during the course of the Session.

(c) *Agriculture*

My government appreciates the serious situation arising from the decline of net farm income over the past three years. Through an Agricultural Development Act, a major attack will be launched on the problem of helping to improve the strength of the family farm and the declining income level in agriculture. My government will establish an Agricultural Development Fund which will have a total capitalization of fifty million dollars to cover all areas of agricultural credit, with special programs aimed at the small farmer and the young farmer. The programs will be particularly and specifically related to marketing opportunities.

The Department of Agriculture has been substantially re-organized to emphasize the major areas of marketing and the family farm, to reflect my government's new direction in these priority areas. My government will coordinate the marketing thrust of the Department of Industry with the Department of Agriculture to make a combined international approach in these two base economic sectors.

In addition, my government will significantly revise existing legislation regarding surface rights throughout Alberta, by introducing a new Surface Rights Act to replace a number of existing statutes, including The Right of Entry Arbitration Act. This new legislation will confirm the important shift of jurisdiction for administering matters arising out of surface rights from the Department of Mines and Minerals to the Department of Agriculture.

(d) *Handicapped Children*

My government believes there needs to be a much higher priority given to facilities and support for Alberta children who have handicaps and learning disabilities. It is felt that society has a clear obligation to confirm its belief in the equal opportunity concept by providing special help for children who start life with disadvantages. This priority involves not new legislation, but new directions in programs which will be presented for consideration of the Members during the course of the Session.

(e) *Mental Health*

My government is committed to reform in mental health, primarily by taking action on the Alberta Mental Health Study of almost three years ago; a study directed by Dr. W. P. N. Blair which concluded that "the mentally ill in Alberta are in an under-privileged position now and the discrimination against them must end." As a result, the government intends to present a new legislative framework, with a completely new Mental Health Act, and supplement this framework with initial program commitments to accelerate programs of mental health reform in Alberta. My government calls for concurrence from all Members in granting this area of public responsibility such a high and immediate priority.

LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

In addition to these five areas of immediate program priority, my government intends to introduce a substantial number of new legislative proposals.

In the very important area of *environmental control*, my government will propose a number of new legislative improvements. These include expanding the impact of The Beverage Containers Act; the introduction of an entirely new Litter Act, the strengthening of the provisions of both The Clean Air Act and The Clean Water Act; a complete revision of the all-encompassing Water Resources Act; and finally, of great significance to conservation practices, a new Land Surface Conservation Act.

To fulfill its important commitment to undertake new directions in *industrial development* for new and expanding Alberta enterprises, my government will present to this Session - as a major thrust of its administration - The Alberta Opportunity Fund Act, with the critical objective of creating a more diversified and a better balanced provincial economy. This Fund will give particular emphasis to new development for Alberta's smaller centres and is separate and distinct from the Agricultural Development Fund.

Labour relations and stability is a prime objective of my government and some amendments to The Alberta Labour Act will be submitted for your consideration, although a general review of this Act will not occur until the Second Session.

Overdue improvements in workmen's compensation are planned and will be presented. My government also intends to amend The Public Service Act and related acts to provide provincial *Public Service employees* with the improved position of arbitration of salary and wage disputes, subject to establishing reasonable statutory guidelines for such arbitration. In consumer affairs, it is intended to overcome certain defects in the existing Credit and Loan Agreements Act.

Equity, excellence and maximum value for the dollar are goals of my government in the high priority area of *education*. Programs to ensure communication and feedback arising out of the Report of the Commission on Educational Planning, expected in June, will be represented. Amendments to The Department of Education Act, The School Act and The Teaching Profession Act will be proposed.

The Attorney General will be introducing legislation by amendment to The Investment Contracts Act and The Securities Act which will tighten the law *protecting the public* from abuse. He will also be introducing legislation dealing with Occupier's Liability and the Rules relating to Perpetuities which will bring the law in these two important areas into line with modern thinking.

Among a number of proposed changes in *highways and traffic* administration will be an Off-Highway Vehicle Act to reflect my government's concern with growing problems in this

sector. These legislative measures will be supplemented by a comprehensive program for extension and improvement of Alberta's highway system reflecting my government's emphasis upon rural development.

In the field of improved *communication*, Alberta Government Telephones' construction program for 1972 includes a substantial rural buried cable program, and from this service to in excess of nine thousand additional rural subscribers will be provided.

Progress in terms of establishing adequate *wilderness* areas within Alberta will be reflected in various programs as well as amendments to the applicable laws. The needed amendments to The Wildlife Act will be submitted for your approval.

In addition to the aforementioned question of possible, revisions in the rate of return from *natural resource development*, a number of statutory improvements will be introduced under the jurisdiction of the Department of Mines and Minerals including, in particular, a new Coal Conservation Act.

My government's support of the *cultural aspects* of our society will be recommended by a novel Art Foundation Act to strengthen support for Alberta artists. Further, my government will request ratification of its desire to undertake a new museum for Southern Alberta to house the magnificent collection of the Glenbow Foundation in Calgary.

My government intends to commence an approach to *repeal* unnecessary statutes and considers its legislative program in relation to both the introduction of new legislation as well as the repeal of outdated laws of Alberta.

My government intends to implement, without delay, the wishes of the electorate to reflect the positive vote by plebiscite in favour of joining with the rest of Canada by accepting *daylight saving time*.

POSITION PAPERS

My government is well aware that apart from legislative measures and budgetary programs, modern government involves the process of developing policy positions from various alternatives, and that these positions reflect and often subsequently create both legislative and budgetary commitments. My government thus has the view that it is in the best interests of the people of Alberta to have a clear understanding of its various policy positions, and that this is particularly so with a new government. Therefore, my government intends to start a new approach by presenting to the Legislature, from time to time, a series of *New Direction Position Papers*, so that the Members and also the public may have a better appreciation of policy positions or alternatives which may form the foundation for subsequent legislative or budgetary proposals. Our emphasis on the need for better long term planning underscores the desirability of such an approach. My government concludes that this approach may improve public understanding of the complexi-

ties of various issues and also provide both the Members and interested citizens with an opportunity to respond to such positions.

CONCLUSION

In summary, my government has established five specific areas of immediate program priorities; it plans to supplement these areas with a substantial list of legislative innovations it intends to reorganize significantly the operations of a number of departments; it confirms its intention of broadening the accessibility of the citizen in relation to the Legislature, and it intends to emphasize strongly the importance of individual M.L.A.'s.

Members of the Legislative Assembly! In due course you will be presented with budget proposals by my government to support these priorities as well as many of these legislative proposals. You will be asked to grant the necessary funds for the operating services and expenditures authorized by the Legislature and to endorse a program of capital financing for the Government of Alberta.

The public accounts of the previous administration for the period concluding March 31, 1971 will be presented for your scrutiny.

I leave you now to the business of the Session, with full confidence that as elected representatives, your singular motivation will be the public interest of all the people of Alberta.

I pray for your wisdom and your strength in your deliberations."

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Assembly.

Ordered, That the Honourable Mr. Lougheed have leave to introduce a Bill intituled "The Alberta Bill of Rights" (Bill No. 1).

He accordingly presented the said Bill and the same was received and read a First time and

Ordered That the Bill be read a Second time tomorrow (Friday).

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that in order to prevent mistakes he had obtained a copy of the Speech of His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor which was laid on the table.

(5) The guidelines used by the Speaker in editing shall be
as follows:

- (a) revisions shall be limited to the correction of grammar,
spelling and punctuation, ensuring that the correct par-
liamentary forms are observed, and minimizing super-
fluous repetition and redundancies but no material
alterations shall be made, nor any amendments which
would in any way tend to change the sense of *what* has
been spoken;
- (b) the transcript shall remain an accurate and, as far as
possible, an exact report of what was said;
- (c) a member has no right to alter the report of any speech
or remarks attributed to him in any way and the Speak-
er shall determine whether or not a member's suggested
correction shall be admitted;

- (d) unless otherwise agreed upon with the Speaker, a member must inform the editor within 30 minutes of the adjournment of any sitting of the Assembly of any corrections he wishes to suggest;
 - (e) unless a member can demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the Speaker, that he has been misreported, a member may not change the sense of anything that he has been recorded as saying, nor shall the member be permitted to make any insertion as an afterthought nor strike out a passage which he regrets having uttered.
- (6) Copies of the Alberta Hansard will be made available at no charge as follows:
- (a) each member of the Assembly shall receive one copy and, in the discretion of the Speaker, may receive no more than nine additional copies;
 - (b) Deputy Ministers of Departments of the public service shall receive not more than five copies for the use of their Departments;
 - (c) the Provincial Librarian, the Provincial Archivist and libraries and newspapers approved by the Speaker shall receive one copy.
- (7) Other copies of the Alberta Hansard will be provided at the following rates:
- (a) Daily \$15.00 per annum
 - (b) Weekly \$12.50 per annum
 - (c) Sessionally \$10.00 per annum
 - (d) Individual copies 25 cents each
- (8) The Alberta Hansard shall commence with an issue for March 2nd, 1972 and shall consist of an issue for every day of the sittings of the Legislative Assembly thereafter.
- (9) The Speaker shall table an annual report of the Alberta Hansard within 15 days of the commencement of each Session, commencing in 1973.

AND BE IT RESOLVED that all previous resolutions of the Assembly concerning the recording and transcription of the proceedings of the Assembly are revoked, effective as of March 2, 1972.

101. Mr. Farran asked the Government the following question with respect to improvements on the Trans-Canada Highway in Calgary, of which he had given notice, and was answered as follows by the Hon. Mr. Copithorne.

Question

Is it possible for the Minister of Highways to re-open negotiations for a Federal Contribution to improvements on the Trans-Canada Highway along 16th Avenue N.W. in Calgary, and what attempts were made to obtain such contributions prior to the expiry of the Trans-Canada Agreement in 1970?

Answer

It is possible for the Minister to re-open negotiations on any subject with the Federal Government. The chances of success in this case, however, are considered minimal for the following reasons:

- (1) The Trans-Canada Highway Agreement has expired as of December 31, 1970.
- (2) Alberta has received the total sum of money which was allotted to it by Canada, namely, 25 million dollars.
- (3) All claims for right-of-way purchasing and property damage were excluded from the Agreement by the Federal Government.
- (4) Contribution was limited to the cost of constructing a roadway with two 12 foot travel lanes and a maximum of 10 foot shoulders, being a total width of 44 feet.
- (5) The work proposed to improve 16th Avenue North would not qualify under the terms of the original Trans-Canada Highway Agreement since it is outside of the 44 foot maximum contributable width.

With respect to what attempts were made to obtain such contributions prior to expiry of the Trans-Canada Highway Agreement in 1970, Alberta was able to take full advantage of the terms of the Trans-Canada Agreement within the boundaries of Calgary.

An important clause in the Agreement was Item 3 (5), "In approving the terms of an Agreement between the Province and a Municipality, the Minister (Federal) shall have regard to the previous practice of the Province with respect to contributions to that Municipality by the Province for the construction of highways, and the Province will disclose to the Minister all existing and previous agreements and records relating to those contributions and will otherwise assist the Minister in determining the practice of the Province with respect thereto."

The practice of the Province with respect to contributions to the Municipality allowed a 50/50 split of construction costs, not including right-of-way. The Provincial contribution was limited to the width of the roadway equal to the cross section of the same standard approaching the city.

The section through the undeveloped portion of Calgary was constructed without contribution from the city. These sections were from the fifth meridian to 6th Street N.E. and a section in the vicinity of 24th Street N.W.

It is, therefore, considered that the Province contributed to the maximum extent, and obtained Federal contributions to the maximum extent allowable under the policies in effect at the time and under the terms of the Trans-Canada Highway Agreement.

120. Mr. Notley asked the Government the following questions with respect to the Moir Committee, of which he had given notice, and was answered as follows by the Hon. Mr. Foster.

Question 1

What was the budget allocated for the Moir Committee?

Answer

Attached is a copy of a memorandum dated March 10, 1971 from the then Minister of Education, the Honourable R. C. Clark to Dr. T. C. Byrne, Deputy Minister of Education. The memorandum lists \$10,000 as the cost of the inquiry. Although reference in the memorandum is to Appropriation 2708, payments were made out of Appropriation 1302 — General Administration, Department of Education.

Question 2

What staff are now employed by it?

Inasmuch as there was no Finance Ministers Conference held in Jasper, Alberta in the fall of 1971, no Ministers of the Executive Council attended it.

Therefore Questions 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 & 7 are meaningless.

Question 1.

- (a) Is the Department of Highways planning to widen the River Road Hinton West this year?

Answer:

The major portion of the road in question lies within the boundaries of the Town of Hinton and is therefore the responsibility of the town administration. There is presently no plan to widen the road either inside of Hinton or to the west.

A meeting was recently sponsored by the Department of Highways and Transport where it was decided by the interested and involved parties that a parallel service road should be constructed south of the river road to provide access to residences and to be used by school buses. Once the section in Hinton is constructed the department will have the portion from the west town boundary to Maskuta Creek built.

This project is planned for the summer of 1972 for completion prior to fall school opening.

Question:

- (b) In the meantime what steps are being taken to ensure the safety of the boys and girls riding in school buses on this road arising out of the danger of joint use of the road by Northwest Pulp and Power trucks, school buses and other traffic?

Answer:

The log hauling truckers have been notified by their employers that between the hours of 7:30 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., on school days, they are to come to a full stop when meeting a school bus. There does not appear to be any serious problem with other traffic.

TUESDAY, APRIL 18, 1972

The Speaker took the Chair at 2:30 o'clock, and addressed the Assembly as follows:

The proposed motion has attracted some attention, in view of this I have considered it very fully. I am anxious to make very clear to the house the reason for the conclusion reached.

On page 95 of *Beauchesne*, the function of the Speaker in this regard is referred to.

The Speaker must be satisfied, firstly, that there is indeed a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege and, secondly, that the matter is being raised at the earliest opportunity.

Since all rules arise out of practical considerations, it must be assumed that the reason for giving these duties to the Speaker is to save the House time which might be lost by debating an invalid allegation of breach of privilege.

Beauchesne makes it clear further that, if the Speaker finds that there is indeed a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege, then the final decision as to whether or not there is such a breach and, if there is, what should be done, is for the Assembly and the Assembly only, and not in any event a matter for the Speaker.

Shorn of its preamble, the point of privilege alleged in this case says simply that the Honourable Premier appointed or signed an Order in Council appointing three more members to a committee than the number referred to in the rules.

It is necessary to state the matter as clearly as that, since no member of this House should run the risk of being accused by means of anything but the clearest statement of the alleged point of privilege.

Referring to rule 52, it is clear that this refers to a "special committee". Moreover, it deals only with a special committee of this Assembly.

It is abundantly clear in the implications in our rules, as well as in *Beauchesne* and in *Erskine May's* authoritative work, that the rules apply to a committee of the Assembly and that a committee of the Assembly is and can be only one that has been appointed by the Legislature or by its authority.

For example, the mere fact that several M.L.A.'s might constitute a panel for some kind of discussion, does not make that panel a committee of this Assembly even though all panel members are M.L.A.'s.

Referring to section 14 of the Legislative Assembly Act, this does not support the alleged point of privilege in any way. It merely permits Members of the Assembly to receive without disqualification reimbursement of expenses in case they are appointed to certain committees (not necessarily Legislative committees) by Order in Council or by the Assembly.

It may be of more than passing importance that, in fact, this committee was not appointed by the Premier as originally

intimated, nor was the Order in Council passed by the Premier as alleged in the statement referred to me. The Order in Council was obviously passed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

In fact, it is actually impossible for a point of privilege to arise under Rule 52. By Rule 52 the Assembly limits *itself* in regard to committees which the Assembly may appoint. Since it is a self-made rule, it is quite unreasonable to say that the Assembly may act in contempt of itself or in breach of its own privileges.

There are, therefore, not less than three non-technical, clear and practical reasons why, on its very face, the proposed motion shows that it does not raise a point of privilege. Any one of these three reasons would be fatal in itself.

Consequently, it is my duty to rule, as also happened with regard to an alleged point of privilege some two weeks ago, that there is not here a matter for referral to the House for debate on a question of privilege. In fact, it would appear that genuine questions of privilege are very rare in Canadian Parliaments and Assemblies.

RE: MOTION 225 on the Order Paper for Tuesday, November 7th, 1972

1. The Point of Order proposed to the Chair on Tuesday (the day before yesterday) is whether Motion 225 is in conformity to the Rules of the House.
2. The Motion, moved by the Honourable Member for Calgary Bow and seconded by the Honourable Member for Bow Valley reads:—"That an Order of the Assembly do issue for a Return showing: What Policy changes have been implemented, as a result of the current transportation study, on the overall review of the transportation needs of the Province of Alberta?"
3. The Chair's attention has been drawn to the second paragraph of Beauchesne's Citation 209 (3) which contains the following:—"The general rule is that information to be obtained from or through any department constituted or regulated by statute, is obtained by means of an order . . ."
4. However, the policy information requested in the Motion which we are now considering, does not exist in any department of government unless it happens to be in privileged or confidential documents. For that reason, the reference to Beauchesne does not solve the problem.
5. What I am about to say should not (for the time being) be taken as a precedent, because some Honourable Members may wish to express further views on the matter, either privately or on some future occasion in the House.
6. The paramount principle must always be, in matters of this kind, to avoid being merely technical and to ensure the practical and effective continuation of the work of the House and of each of its members.

7. The Oral Question Period is, as is well known, intended for short questions which are suitable for short answers on topics of some immediate concern. Their purpose is information and not argument.
8. If a question is arguable and if it is intended to be argued, then it must go onto the Order Paper as a Notice of a Motion for an Order for a Return.
9. However, questions of a general policy nature are not suitable, either for the Oral Question Period, or for Notices of Motions for Orders for Returns.
10. Instead, they should be asked as Written Questions by being placed on the Order Paper.
11. The appropriate Minister then has several options:—
 - (1) She or he may decline to make a policy statement or to reply to the question whatever it may be.
 - (2) He or she may answer the question. Then the answer must be given to the Clerk and be printed in the Votes and Proceedings. This is as provided in our Rule 35(2).
 - (3) Under our Rule 35(3) if the Speaker thinks that the Question requires a lengthy reply, the Speaker must express that opinion to the House. The Government may then, through the appropriate Minister, request the Speaker to direct that the Question stand as a Notice of Motion. This does not imply either acceptance or rejection of the Question by the Government or the Minister. It simply means that when the Motion comes up the matter may be debated. Under our Rules it would have to be seconded.
 - (4) A further option of the Minister under our Rule 35(4) is to say that he has no objection to tabling the required Return. By so stating the Minister automatically converts the Question into an Order for a Return.
12. If the questioner starts off with a Notice of Motion for a Return (and the Motion is carried), this will deprive the Minister of his option or discretion to decline to answer the question, or to decline to make the requested policy statement on that particular topic at that particular time.
13. Our Rule 35 and Beauchesne both indicate this:— it is for the government or the appropriate Minister to decide Whether a question will be answered or whether it will become a Notice of Motion for an Order for a Return or, on the other hand, whether it is to become directly, without a Motion, an Order for a Return: This applies mainly to questions concerning government policy.
14. I would therefore rule that the Motion is not in order. For the reason already mentioned, this is not intended for the time being, to be a precedent. I would respectfully suggest that the Honourable Member for Calgary Bow might wish to deal with the matter by means of placing a Question on the Order Paper—(notwithstanding that the appropriate Minister might in his discretion convert it into a Motion

for an Order for a Return) or convert it directly into an Order for a Return under our Rule 35(4).

Mr. Notley asked the Government the following question, of which he had given notice, and was answered as follows by Hon. Mr. Miniely:

232.

1. What tendering practices are followed in awarding insurance contracts on Government vehicles?
2. How many Provincial Government vehicles are insured?
3. What is the total expenditure on insurance for Government vehicles?
4. Which firm or firms have Government vehicle insurance contracts and what is the value of each such contract?

Answer:

1. (a) Shortly after assuming office in September 1971, the Government became aware that the insurance on Government vehicles was expiring and that the renewal of the insurance policy was imminent.
- (b) In determining how the matter had been handled in the past and how it should be dealt with in the future, the Provincial Treasurer was advised by his Department that tendering for such insurance had not been successful in the past and since 1962 had not been tendered. While, as a matter of principle, this Government believes that tendering of all contracts provides the best measure of economy there are exceptions, of which general insurance is an example. This is a highly technical field with a very narrow breadth of market and calls for a professional level of knowledge which is maintained by relatively few organizations in the province. There had been a previous experience in the past of requesting tenders for such insurance as indicated by Order in Council 1699/62 on November 6, 1962, a copy of which is attached. This Order in Council in-

dicates that the low tenderer for auto insurance be rejected and that a single firm be appointed as agent, being Farrell Agencies of Edmonton. From 1962 to August 1971 there is no record of any tendering, either by insurance companies or insurance agencies on the insurance fleet to the Government and one agency had handled the entire account exclusively during that period. It should be noted that insurance can not be placed directly with a company without paying standard agency commissions.

- (c) The Government then decided that as an interim measure five experienced firms would be called together to act on a concerted basis with the insuring companies to obtain the best possible arrangements for insurance on the Government vehicle fleet. It was then concluded that the former insurance company — Guardian Insurance Company — was prepared to offer, for the next year, the most favourable contract. The following five firms were involved — Roy Henry Insurance Agency Ltd., Reed Shaw Osier Ltd., Steward Campbell Insurance Ltd., Sewell-Huber Agencies Ltd. and Thibaudeau Agencies Ltd. Because it is necessary that an "agent of record" be named on the policy — Roy Henry Insurance Agency Ltd. was named agent of record.
 - (d) This current approach is the subject of review by a new insurance consultant — Mr. Don Morley — appointed in September 1972 by the Deputy Provincial Treasurer (see attached memorandum of October 27, 1972) to reassess the total insurance approach of the Government including the possibility of self-insuring the Government vehicle fleet. In addition, on October 27, 1972 the Deputy Provincial Treasurer appointed a supervising broker for the Government — Reed Shaw Osier Ltd. (see attached letter of October 27, 1972 and Order in Council 1709/72) — to review the placing of all insurance aspects of the Government's operations.
- 2. Between the 9th of November 1971 and the 9th of November 1972 — 3,589 units.
 - 3. Between the 9th of November 1971 and the 9th of November 1972 — \$189,562.
 - 4. The Guardian Insurance Company — \$189,562, subject to additions and deletions to the contract during the course of the year.

233.*Question:*

How does the Minister justify centralization of A.G.T. services which has or will result in reduction of A.G.T. staff in the City of Wetaskiwin in light of the government's stated policy of decentralization of public services?

Answer:

"It is the Government of Alberta's stated policy to decentralize public services *where it is technically and economically practical.*"

A certain amount of judicious centralization, however, through the effective utilization of new technology, has enabled Alberta Government Telephones to keep its rates down to the point where it has required only one general rate increase in over forty years.

A number of years ago, Alberta Government Telephones began replacing the old manually operated local switchboards with automatic equipment connected to the larger centres. If this had not been done, it is estimated that every woman in the province between the ages of eighteen and sixty-five would now have to be employed as a switchboard operator, and that the cost of even a local telephone call might in many cases be prohibitive.

Direct distance dialing and the recentering of toll offices to the larger cities have similarly been making possible the handling of rapidly increasing numbers of long distance calls in a manner that is technically and economically practical. Direct distance dialing provides customers with the convenience of direct dialing, and it maintains a high degree of accuracy in the routing, timing, and billing of calls. Customers, by dialing their own calls, realize substantial reductions in long distance rates.

The efficiencies and economies realized through direct distance dialing, moreover, make possible the introduction of other sought-after services such as extended area service. Extended area service, in turn, still further reduces the justification for toll centres in the smaller cities by reducing the number of operator-handled calls.

The viability of the toll centres is ultimately determined by their size, their volume of traffic, and their traffic patterns. Operating costs for the small toll centres are much higher than those for the larger centres, as the size of the centres goes down, their efficiency goes down also.

The introduction of direct distance dialing, the recentering of toll offices to the larger cities, and changing trends in calling patterns all tend to reduce the number of calls requiring operator assistance. As this process continues, the consolidation of toll centres becomes increasingly imperative, both from a technical and an economic point of view.

The efficiencies and economies realized through direct distance dialing and centralization keeps the basic rates down, provides efficient service, and, in many ways, assist the residents of rural Alberta to achieve a quality of life that they could not otherwise afford. Also, the reasonable rates and efficient service assist in the decentralization of public services in rural Alberta.

When the Provincial Treasurer enquired regarding past practice in renewing the automobile fleet and learned that:

- (a) Tendering had not proven satisfactory in the past nor did sufficient time exist to tender by the expiry date of the policy.
- (b) O/C 1699 in 1962 had specifically rejected the low tender and appointed Farrell Agencies, the only firm which had placed the insurance for 22 years.

- (c) The entire area of government insurance had been poorly handled, was fragmented and the automobile fleet had not been properly rated for several years.

It was obvious that a new approach to insurance was required. Therefore, the five firms, who all were known to be experienced and competent and provided a good cross section of large and small firms in the industry were asked to act as *advisors* on government insurance. The immediate and pressing matter, due to rapid expiry of the policy, was the automobile fleet. They were to act in the following manner on the renewal of the automobile fleet.

- (a) Determine the most suitable and economical insurance coverage on the Province's automobile fleet, including in the future the possibility of self-insuring the fleet.
- (b) Renew the insurance for the immediate period, since time did not allow for alternative courses of action in the shorter term.

The advisory committee, due to the time factor, renewed the insurance contract with Guardian Insurance Co. for the 1971-72 period.

The advisory committee was not to be paid for its services, but rather could in its discretion determine each firm's share of any commission which Guardian Insurance Co. might pay. In the insurance industry, a commission must be paid by the insurer, which runs from 10% to 15%. In the case of the automobile fleet, the commission must be paid by the insurer, Guardian Insurance Co.

3.
 - (a) After several months operation of the advisory committee, it became obvious to the government and to the advisory committee that the only firm which had the staff capacity and placement ability to examine all areas of government insurance along with the Treasury Department was Reed, Shaw & Osier Ltd., the Largest Alberta and Canadian insurance broker.
 - (b) The wisdom of this choice was proven when upon renewal of the automobile fleet for the 1972-73 contract period the total cost to the Province was reduced from \$189,562 to \$162,000, even though 1,111 more units were insured. The cost per unit therefore decreased from \$52.82 to \$34.46 per unit.
 - (c) Finally, while it was desirable to have achieved these savings in 1971-72, time was of the essence. The Provincial Treasurer was concerned that the policy would expire and the Province be left unprotected on the automobiles.
4. Reed, Shaw & Osier are not to receive remuneration for their services. As "Agents of Record" on the automobile fleet, they will receive commissions from Guardian Insurance Co., which must be paid.

will achieve an increasing measure of prosperity and happiness and that an even greater future is assured for all of this nation's people."

The Provincial Secretary then said:

"It is His Honour, the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that the Legislative Assembly be now prorogued and this Assembly is accordingly prorogued."

His Honour, the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Assembly.
