THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 15, 1973

This being the First Day of the Second Session of the Seventeenth Legislative Assembly of the Province of Alberta, for the despatch of business pursuant to a Proclamation of His Honour the Honourable J. W. Grant MacEwan, Lieutenant Governor, dated the eighteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and seventy-three;

The Clerk of the Legislative Assembly read the Proclamation as follows:

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient for certain causes and considerations to convene the Legislative Assembly of Our Province of Alberta, WE DO WILL that you and each of you, and all others in this behalf interested, on THURSDAY, the FIFTEENTH day of FEBRUARY, One Thousand, Nine Hundred and Seventy-three, at the hour of THREE o'clock in the afternoon, for the despatch of business, to treat, act, do and conclude upon those things which in the Legislature of Our Province of Alberta, by the Common Council of Our said Province, may, by the favour of God, be ordained.

HEREIN FAIL NOT

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Our Province to be hereunto affixed.

Mr. Speaker entered the Assembly and took the Chair.

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor entered the Assembly and took his seat on the Throne.

His Honour then read the following Speech from the Throne.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY —

I have the honour to welcome you to the Second Session of the Seventeenth Legislature of the Province of Alberta.

The second phase of my government's administration has begun — it involves a blending of the implementation of programs previously announced with legislative and budgetary proposals for new policy directions and innovative reforms required by our contemporary Alberta society.

My government considers this traditional statement at the outset of each session an opportunity to declare its immediate program priorities; an occasion to restate basic goals and objectives; and a method of establishing a general legislative agenda for the session.

My government believes that Albertans benefit in many ways by a "Fall Sitting" of the Legislature. Accordingly, this innovative procedure will be continued. It provides, as never before, an opportunity for the thoughtful input by citizens respecting proposed new laws and amendments.

Our citizens should be assured of continuing, in-depth scrutiny of government regulations. To this end, the standing legislative committee on law, law amendments and regulations will be re-activated and requested to carry out that scrutiny during the period between the spring and fall legislative sittings, including a determination of any unnecessary laws or regulations which could be repealed or cancelled.

The standing legislative committee on privileges and elections will be requested to continue the process, begun last year, of updating and modernizing the business procedures of the Legislative Assembly.

PHASE ONE – A FOLLOW-THROUGH OF PRIORITIES

My government is satisfied that the immediate program priorities of phase one of its administration, outlined a year ago, have been implemented. Overdue reforms have been launched, but there must be continued attention to these priorities:

(A) Human Rights:

The primary legislation reflected by THE ALBERTA BILL OF RIGHTS AND THE INDIVIDUAL'S RIGHTS PROTEC-TION ACT has now been proclaimed for the protection of our citizens. The Alberta Human Rights Commission is now being organized. The first steps in our multi-cultural policy are under way.

(B) *The Elderly:*

The difficult circumstances of many of our SENIOR CITI-ZENS have been significantly improved by the 1972 breakthrough which relieved them and their dependants from the burden of medicare premiums, most drug costs and optional health services. In addition, they have been granted relief from the provincial education tax. More needs to be done. During this second session my government will introduce an entirely new policy to assure better accommodation and recreation facilities for our senior citizens. This unique new policy will be designed to allow private, volunteer, and non-profit groups, in partnership with government, to provide a wider range of alternatives to assist in the improvement of our pioneers' quality of life.

(C) *Agriculture*:

The pressures faced in maintaining the FAMILY FARM have been eased with the organization of many new programs by the Department of Agriculture, including the Agriculture Development Fund. Assistance for the family farm will continue to be a high priority of my government.

Alberta farmers and the provincial economy benefited from a strong demand for agriculture products during the past year. Total cash receipts from farming operations reached some nine hundred million dollars in 1972 — nearly one hundred million dollars more than in 1971 — and brings our agriculture industry much closer to the goal of one billion dollars by 1975.

My government's objective is to ensure that the growth and activity which has been attained in agriculture will continue in the years ahead. During the forthcoming months my government intends to expand its efforts to increase the production and sale of Alberta farm products. Firstly, by providing our farmers with more information on the type and quality of production needed for domestic and foreign markets and, secondly, by the formation of a series of trade missions to overseas countries. These missions will be coordinated by the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Industry and Commerce, with the cooperation of Agri-Business and the various commodity and farm organizations concerned. My government is dedicated to increase growth in rural areas. Greater attention will be paid to assisting the establishment of secondary and tertiary processing industries in rural Alberta and continued consideration will be given to the decentralization of government offices.

In recognition of the need to stimulate our younger citizens in agricultural occupations it is my government's intention to launch a "Future Farmers of Alberta Program" where young Albertans between the ages of twelve and eighteen will be encouraged to become directly involved in a wide variety of agriculture production.

In addition, it is intended to expand even further the new agricultural programs and to continue to improve the income return to our farmers. Specifically, a new approach to crop insurance will be proposed to reflect the recommendations of the select committee of the legislature.

(D) Mental Health and the Handicapped:

My government is determined to continue with its progress and emphasis for reform in the important areas of MENTAL HEALTH AND HANDICAPPED CHILDREN. In view of this an improved diagnostic assessment and treatment program for handicapped children is proposed at the Alberta Children's Provincial General Hospital in Calgary to extend this service to southern Alberta. In addition, substantial increased services to the handicapped will be developed in many areas of the province. The continued development and improvement of mental health services is anticipated.

Also new programs will be proposed for children with severe emotional problems and to provide intensive treatment for patients who are lawbreakers as a result of mental disturbance.

A RE-STATEMENT - GOALS AND OBJECTIVES OF MY GOVERNMENT

It appears timely at this stage of my government's progress to pause and re-state some of its basic goals and objectives in accordance with the mandate it received. My government's new policies, priority emphasis and long-term planning are all directly related to these longer-term goals and objectives.

(1) A priority for government programs which help citizens least able to help themselves.

(2) A society which provides individual citizens the maximum opportunity for personal initiative and resourcefulness to determine their own destiny without undue government interference.

(3) The pursuit of economic policies which have as their objective not merely growth for growth's sake — but a balanced Alberta economy — less dependent upon natural resources — more extensively diversified — with smaller centres growing to reach their full potential.

- (4) The development of natural resource policies where:
- (a) sufficient resources are conserved for the future requirements of Albertans and their children,
- (b) the resources are only disposed of at fair commodity value and with adequate return to the owners of the resources — the people of Alberta, and
- (c) the development of resources is directed toward processing in Alberta to the extent practical, to expand job opportunities for our citizens.

(5) The support of taxation policies which are primarily predicated on the ability-to-pay concept.

(6) The support of education policies which have the dual goal of equal opportunity and a quality learning environment.

(7) A standard of health care unsurpassed by any other province in Canada and the promotion of its wise use by all our citizens.

(8) An attitude by Albertans that supports the spirit and intent of the Alberta Bill of Rights.

In addition to these objectives, adequate provision will be made for local Municipal Government services; cultural and recreational activities; and many other areas of essential Provincial Government activity.

IMMEDIATE PROGRAM PRIORITIES

(1) To ease the burden of our property taxpayer for social services,

(2) To provide a better deal to Albertans upon the sale of our oil and gas resources, and

(3) To establish new and longer-term education finance plans for basic and post-secondary education facilities.

My government's specific response to these immediate program priorities involve:

(A) The Alberta Property Tax Reduction Plan

In accordance with its mandate my government has already announced the Alberta Property Tax Reduction Plan. This dramatic new program will substantially shift the cost of education and health now being borne by the residential property taxpayer to the general revenues of the province.

It will involve some 50 million dollars of new additional provincial expenditures each year. For our citizen owning average residential property it will mean a property tax reduction of 140 dollars in addition to the homeowners' grant of 75 dollars. Resident farm owners and mobile homeowners will also benefit as will renters.

Municipal Government will be strengthened by increased municipal assistance which includes the Provincial Government taking over full financial responsibility for the operation of hospitals.

Further reforms in this area are being developed to strengthen Municipal Government and will only be undertaken after full consultation with Municipal Government representatives.

(B) A New Era for Energy

My government has already completed a new revenue plan for crude oil; an exploratory drilling incentive system; and made other significant changes in natural resource policies. Last fall my government presented to the legislature new natural gas policies for Albertans.

During this Second Session of the Seventeenth Alberta Legislature my government will:

(1) Report on the progress regarding the implementation of these new natural gas policies for Alberta.

(2) Present a new plan for expanding the benefit of natural gas to rural Albertans.

(3) Outline the design of the proposed two-price rebate system for natural gas.

(4) Finalize a new natural gas revenue and royalty plan for Alberta.

(5) Present a new Oil Sands Development Policy.

(6) Request, as required, a series of legislative changes regarding natural resource development to support these new policies.

(C) Education

A statement of new government policy directions relating to the previously-announced three-year plan to finance basic education will be made, as well as a new long-term plan to finance university education.

LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

In addition to these areas of immediate program priority and the follow-through of the program priorities for phase one — my government intends to introduce a substantial number of new legislative and program proposals.

My government will continue to reflect its concern for environmental management through legislation, programs, policies and dialogue with our citizens. The basis of a new approach to land surface conservation and management will be reflected in a land surface conservation and reclamation act. It will supplement previous legislative thrusts which now protect the air and water resources of the province.

This act will be accompanied by the introduction of a new 'Coal Conservation Act'. New approaches to the growing con-

cern over land use in Alberta, particularly from an agricultural point of view, are in the process of review and evaluation.

Environmental management of fresh water resources will be extended through new river development, irrigation rehabilitation, and lake stabilization programs. A new program of providing our isolated Metis communities with adequate water supply will be proposed.

My government is very concerned about the serious housing conditions of many of our Metis citizens and a new program will be placed before you for your approval.

A forest fire fighters' recognition service will be organized with the purpose of recognizing the special skills and dedication of Alberta forest fire fighters and to improve protection for our forest services.

In addition to these significant new proposals to help improve the conditions for our native people my government will be examining all northern priorities within a provincial framework.

A new provincial parks policy, including — for the first time — provision for provincial parks within urban areas, will be presented.

A new disaster service act will be presented to assure that in the event of any natural disasters the necessary legislative and organizational response will quickly occur to minimize the impact.

Adequate shelter for Albertans is a necessity — to that end my government will continue last year's major expansion in the provision of financing for new dwellings.

As stated a year ago my government intends to present amendments to The Alberta Labour Act for your consideration. The report of the select committee on workmen's compensation will be referred to the members for response and in due course a completely revised workmen's compensation act will be presented. A commission on industrial safety, long overdue, will be announced.

A completely revised Police Act will be introduced to reflect my government's concern for the growing crime rate in our province.

Continued expansion of the successful Alberta Opportunity Company will benefit an even larger number of Alberta businesses.

Programs under my government's previously-announced transportation policy, the first ever stated for Alberta, will be presented.

Highway extension and improvement will proceed at an increased pace in 1973. Long-term highway plans, just completed, will reflect special emphasis on rural development. Plans are also being developed to aid in alleviating transportation difficulties of our large urban centres.

Expansion of extended area service and further progress in the rural buried cable program will be twin features of the Alberta Government Telephones construction program this year.

My government recognizes the imbalances in public health services available to our citizens, particularly children, living in isolated communities. To help overcome some of this imbalance three new programs will be developed in the public health field. Speech therapy services will be established in rural and isolated centres staffed by Alberta's first graduating class in this important area of helping children. A mobile dental program will be initiated to bring improved dental services within reach of children living in rural and northern Alberta. In addition, it is proposed that health units will be enabled, with government assistance, to provide improved services to the mentally ill and handicapped.

Policy statements and new programs related to the new education finance plan will be presented as well as legislation to establish a new, coordinated 'Educational Television and Radio Corporation'. Teacher Pension Legislation' will be updated. Selected portions of the commission on educational planning which reflect the educational philosophy and policies of Albertans and their government will be submitted for your consideration.

Legislation in response to the government's decision to transfer the responsibility for the universities and colleges commissions to the Department of Advanced Education will be proposed. At the same time the Advanced Education Department's responsibility for further and continuing education will be broadened.

Today's consumer must receive adequate information and, where appropriate, greater protection in the market place. Legislation to achieve that end will be presented to you, as will plans for expanded and better coordinated government guidelines in this area. Sharply rising food prices are a matter of concern to my government.

In view of the expanding public interest in the preservation of our heritage resources, my government proposes to introduce legislation as a first step in a comprehensive plan to provide for the protection and orderly development of these valuable resources. Exchange programs between young people living in the cities and those in the rural areas will be initiated. Your government's concern for the health and fitness of Albertans will be demonstrated through programs aimed at encouraging people of all ages to participate in enjoyable fitness activities. Exposure of cultural activities in a wide variety of interests will be promoted.

The specific challenge to maintain the quality of life in our larger cities is clearly recognized by my government and, as indicated, significant progress during the next year in the areas of city parks, recreation facilities and urban transportation is proposed. There will be active tri-level consultation during the coming year to deal specifically with special problems of Alberta's two metropolitan centres of Edmonton and Calgary.

ALBERTA'S ECONOMY

Nineteen hundred and seventy-two saw new records established in almost every area of the Alberta economy. The number of citizens employed in the province reached an all-time high. Wages and salaries for our people reached a record: in short, our citizens had more to spend than at any time in our history. My government will continue its efforts to build and diversify economic growth and to provide new and better job opportunities for all our people.

FEDERAL-PROVINCIAL RELATIONS

As a result of my government's initiatives in presenting the potential of Alberta to Canadians at large, unique opportunities are now available to alter long-entrenched national policies which have tended to thwart the full growth and potential of this province and of the west. The historic nature of recently proposed Federal-Provincial conferences is recognized by my government and it welcomes the challenge to use these opportunities to achieve meaningful progress for Albertans and all Canadians. The great potential for Alberta of the entire Canadian north receives my government's continual attention.

CONCLUSION

In summary, my government has indicated its intention to follow through on the five program priorities set forth a year ago and to undertake three specific new areas of immediate program priority. It intends to supplement these areas with a substantial number of legislative improvements and to present to the members a series of program proposals.

Members of the Legislative Assembly! In due course you will be presented with budget proposals by my government to support these priorities as well as many of these legislative proposals. You will be asked to grant the necessary funds for the operating services and expenditures authorized by the legislature and to endorse a program of capital financing for the Government of Alberta.

The public accounts for the period concluding March 31, 1972 will be presented for your scrutiny.

I leave you now to the business of the session, with full confidence that as elected representatives, your motivation will be the public interest of all the people of Alberta.

I pray for your wisdom and your strength in your deliberations.

Which said Committees shall severally be empowered to examine and enquire into all such matters and things as shall be referred to them by the Assembly, and to report from time to time their observations and opinions thereon with power to send for persons, papers and records.

ON ORDERS OF THE DAY BEING CALLED, the Honourable Leader of the Opposition, Mr. Henderson, moved as follows:

"I beg leave to make a motion, seconded by Mr. Robert Clark, the Honourable Member for Olds-Didsbury, for the adjournment of the Assembly for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, as per section 23, subsections 1, 2, and 3, of our Rules, Orders and Forms of Procedure.

In the interest of ensuring that the freedom of speech and freedom of the press, provided for by the Bill of Rights, is not further jeopardized, it is of urgent public importance for this House to set out immediately the contractual limitations between the Government of Alberta and the R.C.M.P. to guarantee that in the future the R.C.M.P. will not be used as a vehicle for investigating private citizens for political purposes."

Mr. Speaker ruled on the matter as follows:

With regard to the request for leave, under Rule 23, I think I might respectfully draw to the attention of the House that this type of debate does not lead to a resolution. The request for leave, if it is granted, leads to a debate. It does not lead to a resolution that the House do or decide one point or another. I'm not even aware that there may be a vote at the end of such a debate because the request for leave is merely a request for an opportunity to debate, and has been pointed out, both last year and today, the question is not the importance of the matter. And, concerning this, the Chair expresses no opinion. The question is rather the urgency of debate, and there is no doubt with the rules of relevance, and the rules of debate being as broad as they are with respect to the debate on the Speech from the Throne that there is practically nothing that might be said under this request for leave, if it is granted, which could not be said in the Throne Speech debate, and I must therefore rule that the request does not come within the terms of Rule 23.

Redevelopment of the park commenced last fall and is scheduled to be completed early 1973. Lesser Slave Lake Provincial Park was closed to overnight camping during the summer of 1972. Presently, in the Martin River area, the campground is under construction. In the event this campground is not completed for the 1973 season, a temporary campground will be established.

Question (3):

What are the names of the new provincial parks which were opened?

Answer:

See Question (1).

Question (4):

What are the names of the provincial parks which were closed?

Answer:

See Question (2).

Question (5):

Was there correspondence or communication between the government and people or organizations in the vicinity of the dosed parks, before they were closed?

Answer:

In the case of Taber and O'Brien Provincial Parks the closing was caused by the flooding and there was no prior warning. In the case of Lesser Slave Lake Provincial Park, letters were written to Mayor Boisvert, Mayor of Slave Lake, Mr. Dennis Barton M L A and Mr L. Miller. President of Slave Lake and District Chamber of Commerce. There was also a press release issued by the Hon. Dr. Allan A. Warrack, Minister of Lands and Forests.

ON ORDERS OF THE DAY BEING CALLED:

— The Hon. Mr. Foster, Minister of Advanced Education, announced to the Assembly that his Department and The Universities Commission had issued a joint statement today clarifying jurisdiction areas over which there had previously been concern, and tabled same. — The Hon. Mr. Leitch, Attorney General, announced three appointments to the Alberta Law Foundation as provided for by The Legal Professions Act.

—The Honourable the Speaker announced to the Assembly as follows:

- 1. Earlier this month the hon. member for Calgary Mountain View alleged a breach of privilege with regard to an order for a return which was made on November 21st, 1972.
- 2. The debate on the motion which preceded the making of that order for a return is in Hansard for November 21st, 1972 at pages 79-49 to 79-51.
- 3. The allegation of breach of privilege and the debate on that allegation are in Hansard for March 6th, 1973 at pages 13-492 to 13-497.
- 4. I have now had an opportunity to examine the abovementioned portions of Hansard, and some of the considerable mass of material which was tabled in reply to the said order for a return.
- 5. The first point of privilege purports to arise out of paragraph (4) of the order for return which reads:
 - "(4) Would the minister provide a map upon which are displayed all legally and illegally closed road allowances in Alberta."

The reply to this paragraph of the order, as tabled by the hon. Minister of Highways, is as follows:

- "(4) Not available in map form. Copies of townships index cards are provided which show the locations of applications made for closures and corresponding file numbers."
- 6. The hon. member for Calgary Mountain View, in the debate on the motion for the order for return said, in part: "... I believe the question could be understood in the manner in which it is written ..."

Taking it as it is written, the order requires the production of "a map upon which are displayed all legally and illegally closed road allowances in Alberta."

- 7. Careful inquiries by the Clerk Assistant indicate that there is no such map, or anything that could be even loosely referred to as a map displaying all legally and illegally closed road allowances in Alberta.
- 8. The maps shown to the Chair by the hon. member for Calgary Mountain View could not possibly be described as complying with the text of the order. They were made in 1969 and show only a small portion of the province. If they had been tabled in reply to the order, the hon. member for Calgary Mountain View could have tried to raise a point of privilege for alleged non-compliance, just as easily as he purported to do on March 5th.

- 9. (The results of the inquiries of the Clerk Assistant are in a memorandum of which copies are being delivered to both sides of the House.)
- 10. Consequently, since the order for return asked for a nonexistent document, the return stating that there are no such documents is fully correct. Hence the answer given by the hon. Minister of Highways could not possibly be construed as a breach of privilege, or even as an impropriety.
- 11. There is, therefore, not even a prima facie case of privilege.
- 12. The further point of privilege raised by the hon. member on the same occasion refers to paragraph 3 of the said order for return, which reads as follows:
 - "(3) Do any members of the Legislature of Alberta have any interest in land upon which there are legally or illegally closed road allowances in Alberta?"
- 13. Again, the words must be given their ordinary meaning, as expressed in the order. The hon. member for Calgary Mountain View knows well that any lands on which road allowances (using that term in its ordinary sense) are located, are publicly owned, and could not possibly belong to any hon. member of the legislature.
- 14. Consequently, the item asked for does not exist. Even if the words of the order were given a very extended meaning, it seems clear, and common knowledge, that no such records are kept.
- 15. Consequently, the reply given to this part of the order is also fully correct and proper, and cannot in any conceivable way constitute a breach of privilege. Of necessity, this means that there is no prima facie case of privilege.
- 16. Subject to being referred to precedent to the contrary, which the Chair has so far not been able to find, and does not expect to find, an order for a return cannot be construed as ordering a minister or a government to produce a document which does not exist.
- 17. As mentioned in this Assembly last year, there are very few genuine questions of privilege arising in Canadian legislatures. Since a genuine question of privilege may be a very serious matter, the Chair would respectfully urge all hon. members to be most circumspect in this regard and to weigh carefully any alleged matter of privilege.

"The point of privilege raised yesterday by the hon. member for Calgary Mountain View may be described as follows:—

Order No. 109 of this Assembly for a return requires that certain information be provided by the government according to "actual locations".

The return, as filed, gives the information according to zones, of which there are (as was, I believe, mentioned in debate) 14 in the province.

The basic principle governing the duties of the Speaker and those of the House, in relation to a point of privilege, is simple and practical. The House and the Speaker have two different functions:—

If the Speaker finds that the matter was raised at the first opportunity (as it obviously was in this case) his only other duty is to decide whether, on the face of it, there is a possible case of breach of privilege. He does not make a decision which says:—"This is a breach of privilege". That is for the Assembly.

In other words, the Speaker's duty here, as in many other instances, is to protect the Assembly against a waste of time. This is very similar in effect to an ordinary preliminary hearing. In a preliminary hearing the judge or magistrate decides whether the charge may be worth bothering with. If it seems to him that it is, he commits for trial. This does not mean at all that there is a finding of guilt.

Likewise, the Speaker's ruling that there is a prima facie case of breach of privilege cannot constitute a finding of guilt in any way.

As the presiding officer of the highest authority in a province, the Speaker does not in any way sit in judgment on the Assembly, the Opposition or the Government. He is still one of the 75 M.L.A.s but with the special duty of applying the rules to assist the House in getting its work done.

It may well happen that what the Speaker finds to be a prima facie case of privilege is found not to be a real case of privilege if it is examined by the Assembly with all of its power and means of inquiry (which the Speaker does not have). That would not mean in any way that the Speaker would be overruled. A mere prima facie case of privilege may turn out not to be a real case of privilege just as a bottle labelled "whiskey" may turn out to contain tea.

The hon. Deputy Premier's motion to refer to a Committee of the House the matter of orders for a return, cannot change the nature of a prima facie case of privilege which may have already arisen. Moreover, the Deputy Premier's intended motion dealt with motions for a return generally, and not with the one we are now concerned with specifically.

If the word "semantics" indicates an undue preoccupation with the meaning of words, then it cannot be applied to this situation.

The debate on the motion for a return cannot be given too much effect in interpreting the meaning of the words. An order for a return should be construed according to its own text. It is quite immaterial in this regard from which part of the House the amendment came.

The question is one of simple every-day non-technical language. There, in ordinary language, is a difference between requiring names and requiring locations. The locations may lead to discovery of the names, but the Assembly voted for that difference. In plain ordinary every-day language, to know the location of something is to be able to find it. That cannot be said for a zone whose average area is 1/14th of the area of the province.

I must therefore find that there is here a prima facie case of breach of privilege, and that it was raised at the first opportunity."

The point of order raised in the Assembly last Thursday, October 11th, is whether Bill 211 may be debated for second reading.

This Bill provides for compulsory reporting of child battering.

So does section 8 of Bill 21 which has already been passed earlier at this year's session.

Bill 211, the one that is now being considered, was introduced on March 29th, 1973 by the Hon. Member for Calgary Bow.

Bill 21, the one already passed, was introduced on May 4th, 1973 by the Hon. Member for Calgary McKnight. It received second reading on May 9th and third reading and royal assent on May 10th, 1973.

Hence, the principle of Bill 211, which we are now considering, has already been enacted into law (in Bill 21, section 8). This occurred before Bill 211 came up for second reading.

At first it might seem to honourable members that section 8 of the later Bill (Bill 21) should not have been debated for second reading on May 9th of this year. Such debate anticipated, in part, the debate which might have been expected later, in second reading of the earlier Bill 211.

The principle which forbids such anticipation of debate, is clearly set out in Beauchesne on page 116 in annotation 131. It is related to the principle which forbids debating the same matter twice at the same session.

However, in regard to bills, there is an important exception to the rule against anticipation.

This exception is explained in Beauchesne at page 273 in Annotation 373.(2) in the following text:—

"There is no rule which restrains the presentation of two or more bills relating to the same subject, and containing similar provisions."

Then, after referring to two precedents, the text of Beauchesne continues:—

"But if a decision of the House has already been taken on one such Bill, for example if the Bill has been given or refused a second reading, the other is not proceeded with if it contains substantially the same provisions"

That is our situation here. This obliges me to say that the debate on Bill 211 may not continue and that Bill 211 must come off the order paper.

Re: Bills 203 and 204.

There has been a suggestion that the same obstacle faces Bills 203 and 204. Both Bills would protect an employee who gives information against his employer concerning offences by the employer against The Clean Air Act or The Clean Water Act.

It might seem that similar protection is given under section 153 of Bill 35 which was also passed at this 1973 session and is now The Alberta Labour Act, 1973.

However, it presently appears to me that section 153 of The Alberta Labour Act, 1973 expressly confines its protection to anything an employee might do under Part 4 of The Labour Act. Hence it does not seem that section 153 applies to either The Clean Air Act or The Clean Water Act.

Bills 203 and 204 do however, apply to The Clean Air Act and The Clean Water Act respectively, and hence, although the subject is again, employee protection, the principle at present appears to me to be different.

Since honourable members have not yet had an opportunity to express their views on this point of order, I would only indicate that I would be inclined to think that second reading debate on Bills 203 and 204 would be in order."

Answer:

There were 14 complaints directed to the Alberta Automobile Insurance Board from January 1, 1973 to date.

- (a) There was one complaint directed at the cost of insurance for male drivers under 25 years of age.
- (b) The Board advised all insurers at a meeting in May that an application for rate change that did not include a significant measure of relief in rates for males under 25 would not be approved. All applications since then have complied.
- (c) The "reasonable rate" set out in Sessional Paper 100/73 referred to the premium for accident benefits and the premium for medical payments included in accident benefits that were set at the time of the introduction of compulsory insurance. It was felt that the rates charged were "reasonable" as they were at that time considered not excessive to the consumer and adequate to ensure the solvency of the insurer.
- (d) The Board has directed all insurers to submit applications for change in rates in a specific manner and to provide adequate justification for any change requested. The Board possesses the statistics compiled as required under Section 97(7) of the Alberta Insurance Act and these are used by the Board to verify the justification advanced in support of the changes requested.

In the school year January 1, 1973 to June 30, 1973:

(a) How many school boards chose accreditation for their senior high schools?

ANSWER

- (i) Five schools in Lethbridge, Calgary and Camrose were accredited at the beginning of the 1972-73 school year.
- (ii) Full Accreditation Forty school boards chose full accreditation. The Grade XII population in

these school jurisdictions represented 11% of the total Grade XII population.

Partial Accreditation — Seventy-seven school boards chose accreditation with the student having the option of accepting the school mark or writing the departmental examination. For students who wrote, the higher of the school mark or the departmental mark (combination examination and teacher mark) was assigned as the final score. The Grade X I I population in these school jurisdictions represented 64% of the total Grade X I I population.

Therefore, 75% of the Grade XII population resided in jurisdictions whose school boards had accepted immediate accreditation.

(b) How many boards required their students to write the Grade XII examinations in June, 1973?

ANSWER

One hundred forty-five school boards (25% of the Grade X I I population) required their students to write since they decided not to accept accreditation until September, 1973; of these

- (i) 107 boards requested that students be awarded the higher of the school mark or departmental mark. The Grade XII population in these schools represented 19% of the total Grade XII population,
- (ii) 38 boards requested no change in the procedure. The Grade XII population in these schools represented 6% of the total Grade XII population.
- (c) How many students wrote one or more Grade XII departmental examination subjects in June 1973?

ANSWER

For the past two or three years, approximately 20,000 students had written examinations in June.

The decrease in numbers was not as great as anticipated during this past year with 15,143 students writing at least one departmental examination.

- (d) What was the percentage of courses passed in June 1973 by:
 - (i) Examination method?
 - (ii) Accredited procedure?

ANSWER

The number of courses written by each of the two procedures and the percentage greater than 50 are shown in the following table:

Since 75% of the students were in schools which had adopted accreditation, it was anticipated that fewer examination papers would have been written.

Bids were invited and contracts were awarded with respect to separate phases of the 27 wells in Stage 1. The contracts related to surveying, drilling, coring, logging, casing, cementing, perforating, fracturing, tubing, wellheads and other well equipment and services. Up to December 1, 1973 \$838,110 had been expended in drilling and evaluating these 27 wells. Some of the invoices for testing and wellsite services have as yet not been submitted. It is estimated that these will not exceed \$30,000.

Bids were again invited and contracts awarded with respect to the various phases of the 50 wells in Stage 2 to be drilled during the period commencing October 16, 1973 and expected to terminate next January. Invoices are just now being submitted for the first casing delivered and services undertaken with respect to the Stage 2 wells.

Question:

- 3. What have been the findings or results of the drilling of each well as of December 1, 1973?
- Answer: Stage 1 of the program has resulted in 22 dually completed gas wells to produce from the Medicine Hat formation and the Milk River formation and five dually completed gas wells to produce from the Second White Specks formation and the Milk River formation.

Gas has been indicated in the 25 wells already drilled in Stage 2. After these wells are perforated and fractured it is planned that 11 will be dually completed to produce gas from the Medicine Hat formation and the Milk River formation and 14 will be dually completed to produce gas from the Second White Specks formation and the Milk River formation.

"MR. SPEAKER:

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF ALBERTA:

In bringing to a close this Second Session of the Seventeenth Legislative Assembly, I desire to express my appreciation of the earnest and diligent manner in which you have applied yourselves to your public duties.

"It is with great satisfaction that I have noted the careful attention you have given to the consideration of the various important measures which have come before you and your steadfast zeal for the promotion of the welfare of our Province.

"I thank you for the provision you have made to meet the needs of the Public Service. The sums of money you have thus provided will be expended by my Ministers in accordance with the principles of efficient and economic administration.

"In relieving you of your duties and declaring the Assembly prorogued, I pray that under Divine Providence the Province will achieve an increasing measure of prosperity and happiness and that an even greater future is assured for all of this nation's people."

The Provincial Secretary then said:

"It is His Honour, the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that the Legislative Assembly be now prorogued and this Assembly is accordingly prorogued."

His Honour, the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Assembly.
