Written Questions

WQ197. Ms Carlson to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 32):

On what dates between January 1, 1997 and December 31, 1998, did Alberta Environmental Protection conduct unannounced inspections of the Big Valley Industrial Landfill and the Ryley Hazardous Waste Landfill; on each occasion how many samples were taken of waste that had already been buried in the landfill and how many of waste being dumped; what substances, if any, were detected in excess of permissible limits and what action was taken?

WQ198. Ms Carlson to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 32):

Between January 1, 1997 and February 16, 1999, at which provincial parks and recreation areas was a contract for the private sector management of a campground terminated; at which sites has a new contract been signed with another private sector operator; which sites are now being managed by the Government, and which sites have closed?

WQ199. Ms Carlson to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 32):

What is the name and legal description of each energy industry site at which vandalism or terrorist activity was recorded between January 1, 1997 and February 16, 1999, what is the name of the company owning or leasing the site, what damage was recorded and at which locations has a charge been laid?

WQ204. Ms Carlson to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 32):

How many staff were employed by Alberta Environmental Protection on January 1, 1999 for the Pollution Control Division, how many announced and how many unannounced inspections did they make in the calendar year 1998, what infringements were detected and what was the outcome in each case?

WQ206. Mrs. Soetaert to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 39):

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Given that on pages 12, 31 and 32 of the Auditor General's report entitled "Examination of the WestView Regional Health Authority" dated March 31, 1998, the Auditor General states that different Regional Health Authorities had different assets and liabilities at their inception as well as different costs in delivering services, when will the Government implement a funding formulae that considers the factors which the Auditor General cited on pages 12, 31 and 32?

WQ210. Mrs. Soetaert to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 39):

In the funding formulae for Regional Health Authorities, how many data proxies (as opposed to factual data generated by the respective Regional Health Authorities) are being used and from what data sources are they derived?

How many inspections did Alberta Environmental Protection staff conduct of licensed industrial facilities each year between January 1, 1990 and December 31, 1998, how many infringements were found each year and in how many cases each year was enforcement action taken?

What is the total number of industrial facilities that were licensed to operate in the province by Alberta Environmental Protection each year from January 1, 1990 until December 31, 1998, and how many approvals and permits were issued to such facilities in each of those years?

WQ213. Ms Carlson to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 41):

How many inspectors (full time equivalents) were working in Environmental Services, Alberta Environmental Protection on December 31, 1998 and how many were working in equivalent positions on the same date each year from 1990 to 1997?

WQ214. Ms Carlson to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 41):

How many oil and gas industry well site reclamation certificates were issued each year from January 1, 1990 until December 31, 1998, and how many sites were inspected each year?

WQ215. Ms Carlson to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 41):

How many water wells were reclaimed each year from January 1, 1990 until December 31, 1998, and how many well inspections were carried out each year?

WQ216. Ms Carlson to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 41):

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How many staff (full time equivalents) worked on regulatory approvals in Environmental Service, Alberta Environmental Protection on December 31, 1998, and how many were working in similar positions on the same date each year from 1990 to 1997?

2. 509. Mr. Marz to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to establish effective accountability measures within the health care system through mechanisms at the point of health service access, involving both the consumer and provider.

3. 510. Mr. Shariff to propose the following motion (amended):

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to *consider establishing* a Council of Ministers for Social Issues to coordinate social policy development and delivery, and to consult openly with Albertans about our changing social needs.

4. **511.** Mr. Fischer to propose the following motion (amended):

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to investigate ways to improve *traffic safety at rural intersections by improving the visibility of "Important Intersections Ahead" signs or by adding additional signage informing drivers of upcoming intersections.*

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to compile an assessment report which shall include indicators of vulnerabilities in Alberta children and the status of provincial programs for such children, to be tabled annually in the Legislative Assembly.

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to expedite the delivery of multi-department Children's Services programs to operate directly within our school system.

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to provide additional resources to schools to cover the costs of textbooks, software, technology, learning materials, and teacher training that are required because of the introduction of a new curriculum mandated by the Government.

9. 516. Ms Carlson to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to continue a reconfigured Special Places program until it is complete and to establish a panel of independent scientific experts to advise the Government on what areas need further protection to conserve the biodiversity of all ecoregions in the province.

10. 517. Mr. Sapers to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly establish an all-party Select Committee of the Legislative Assembly on the Future of the Alberta Treasury Branches to seek the input of Albertans through public hearings.

11. 518. Mr. Strang to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to make more bursaries and student loans available for students who have to relocate to one of Alberta's major urban centres to attend post-secondary school.

12. 519. Mr. Dickson to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to refer all provincial user fees, licences, and premiums to the Standing Committee on Law and Regulations for review.

13. 520. Mr. Johnson to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to implement strategies aimed at increasing the opportunity for Alberta students to participate in student exchange programs, particularly with respect to learning new languages, and to initiate new international student exchange partnerships.

14. 521. Mr. Gibbons to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to engage in public consultation about an alternative funding model for public education.

15. 522. Ms Leibovici to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to increase funding for long term care to provide better access and to ensure that individuals are able to remain in their home communities when they require long term care.

16. 523. Mr. Yankowsky to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to encourage motorists to practice safe driving by not using hand held cellular phones while operating a vehicle.

17. 524. Dr. Pannu to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to introduce legislation which requires employers to provide pro-rated benefits to part-time and casual workers that are equivalent to those provided to full-time workers; extends the scope of employment standards, health and safety, and workers' compensation legislation to farms and ranches employing three or more workers; imposes mandatory penalties on employers who repeatedly violate employment standards; enables the Labour Relations Board to impose first collective agreements; bans the use of replacement workers during a legal strike or lockout; restores full collective bargaining rights, including the right to strike, to nurses, civil servants and other public sector workers providing non-emergency services.

18. 525. Mrs. Gordon to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to explore an alternative source of funding for education rather than generating revenue for this purpose through property taxes.



19. 526. Dr. Massey to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to conduct an independent review of student costs incurred in accessing post-secondary education programs.

20. 527. Mr. Magnus to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to make it a requirement that Alberta's public schools provide for the singing of our National Anthem once per day.

21. 528. Mr. White to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to consider getting out of the business of direct loans and guarantees to the private sector through the wind-down of the Alberta Opportunity Company, with no new loans and guarantees to be authorized after March 31, 2000, and with any net profits of the wind-down to be used to retire the province's debt.

22. 529. Mrs. Sloan to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to undertake a formal comparison of the services, costs and outcomes provided by public and private sectors where services are provided for the Department of Family and Social Services, specifically Child Welfare, Day Care and Handicapped Children's Services.

23. 530. Mrs. Burgener to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to increase public visibility of prevention and treatment addiction programs, in particular those programs addressing the abuse of alcohol by teens, by working in cooperation with community-based support services.

24. 531. Ms Blakeman to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to eliminate health care premiums for all seniors.

25. 532. Mr. Broda to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to consider enabling the Tire Recycling Management Association of Alberta to accept tires from off-highway vehicles and other previously exempt tires for inclusion in the scrap tire processing and recycling industry to be processed in an environmentally acceptable manner.

26. 533. Dr. Nicol to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to revise the Farm Income Disaster Program so that it helps all farmers whose operations are viable in the long term, but who are experiencing short term disaster.

27. 534. Mrs. O'Neill to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to develop performance measures applicable to Alberta's varied climates to allow for thorough testing of building products prior to them being added to the Building Code.

28. 535. Ms Paul to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to commission an independent review to evaluate the performance and cost-effectiveness of Delegated Administrative Organizations.

29. 536. Mr. Pham to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to consider reinvesting a percentage of VLT (video lottery terminal) revenues into an endowment fund for primary and secondary education.

30. 537. Mr. Severtson to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to press the Federal Government to implement the recommendations outlined in the Grain Handling and Transportation Review prepared by the Hon. Willard Estey.

31. 538. Dr. Pannu to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to not proclaim Bill 27 (the Electric Utilities Amendment Act, 1998) and instead appoint a broadly based task force to investigate and hold public consultations on all aspects of Alberta's electrical system.
