Upon completion of studies, what was the average debt load of post secondary students who had received assistance from the Student Finance Board in the fiscal years 1990-1991, 1995-1996 and 2000-2001?

WQ8. Dr Pannu to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 36):

What was the average waiting period from the filing of a complaint with the Human Rights Commission to conciliation in the fiscal years 1990-1991, 1995-1996, and 2000-2001, and what was the average waiting period from conciliation to investigation of a human rights complaint in these same fiscal years?

WQ9. Dr. Pannu to ask the Government the following question (Due Day 36):

Of the monies the Government received from health care premiums for the fiscal years 1999-2000, 2000-2001, and 2001-2002, what amount was remitted by employers, and of that amount, how much was paid by employers on behalf of employees?
