Motions Other Than Government Motions

505. Hon. Mr. Schmidt to propose the following motion (replaced):

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly

- (a) endorse the principle of polluter pays; and
- (b) oppose the use of Government revenue to incentivize the clean-up of abandoned oil and gas infrastructure by companies that are legally responsible for that clean-up.

506. Mr. Smith to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to work with other provinces to ensure the unfair federal equalization formula is renegotiated before it expires in 2024.

507. Ms Goehring to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly

- (a) recognize that Alberta has been acknowledged for having a world-class public education system;
- (b) oppose any efforts to create a privatized, two-tier education system; and
- (c) oppose the use of vouchers for education, similar to those used in the United States.

508. Mr. Gotfried to propose the following motion (replaced):

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to reject the federal government's proposal to transition to an electricity system with netzero emissions by 2035, given the extraordinary costs to Albertans, and instead support sustainable initiatives that reduce emissions from electricity generation.

509. Mr. Long to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to include accredited funded private schools in grades 1 to 12 transportation funding to ensure equity in school choice.

511. Mr. Getson to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to create a corridor management authority to work with the relevant Canadian provincial, territorial, and municipal governments, First Nations, Metis Nations, and American state governments to coordinate the development, growth, enhancement, and best use of the Alberta portions of the following designated economic corridors: Trans-Canada Highway, Yellowhead Highway, Cowboy Trail, Veterans Memorial Highway, Highways 3, 11 and 686, Alberta to Alaska, Alberta to Churchill, Alberta to the Port of Prince Rupert, Alberta to Vancouver, and the CANAMEX/North-South Trade Corridor.

512. Mr. Deol to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to introduce a Bill that would prohibit a professional regulatory body from including Canadian work experience or experiential training as a requirement to obtain the necessary credentials to work in that profession in Alberta if all other requirements are met.

513. Mr. Barnes to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to restore the 10-per-cent flat provincial personal income tax rate as outlined in the United Conservative Party's Member Policy Declaration, approved on October 22, 2022

514. Mr. Sigurdson to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the federal government to suspend the carbon tax to address the affordability crisis in Canada and permanently exempt agri-food production and the transportation industry from the application of the carbon tax to keep food affordable.

516. Hon. Ms Phillips to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to adopt the NDP Family Care Teams Plan, which aims to modernize primary care to provide one million more Albertans access to a family doctor.

517. Mr. Toor to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly reaffirm that

- (a) Alberta has a multicultural, multi-faith, and multi-ethnic society;
- (b) religious freedom should be a universal human right globally;
- (c) every person has a right to equal treatment without discrimination because of religious expression;

(d) freedom of speech and freedom of religion are cornerstone values in our society.

518. Ms Pancholi to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly

- (a) recognize the negative impact that the repealed Chinese Immigration Act, 1923, had on Chinese immigrants to Canada;
- (b) denounce all forms of discrimination currently and historically experienced by the Chinese community in Alberta and Canada; and
- (c) urge the Government to consult with the Chinese communities to determine the best way to acknowledge both the historical discrimination against the Chinese community and the remarkable achievements and contributions of Chinese Canadians to the economic, social, and cultural fabric of Alberta.

519. Mr. Walker to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to review the Family Law Act for the purpose of considering amendments to that Act that would enable a parent who has a right to receive court-ordered financial support or parental access to more effectively enforce or exercise those rights
