16. Hon. Mr. Johnston to propose the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Assembly, pursuant to section 6(4.1) of the Alberta Heritage Savings Trust Fund Act, authorize for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1991, the making of investments under section 6(1)(c) of that Act in:

- (1) the Alberta Agricultural Development Corporation in an amount not to exceed \$40,000,000 in aggregate;
- (2) the Alberta Mortgage and Housing Corporation in an amount not to exceed \$103,000,000 in aggregate;
- (3) the Alberta Opportunity Company in an amount not to exceed \$28,000,000 in aggregate.

- (1) What is the total number of Alberta Government Telephones employees in communities with a population:

That an Order of the Assembly do issue for a Return showing: A copy of all studies showing the benefits of privatization of Alberta Government Telephones either prepared for or by departments of the Government for use in analysis and preparation of privatization proposals for AGT.

**354.** Mr. Bruseker to propose the following motion:

That an Order of the Assembly do issue for a Return showing: A copy of all reports prepared for or by the Government regarding the effect of privatization of Alberta Government Telephones upon the economic development and viability of rural communities. **355.** Mr. Bruseker to propose the following motion:

That an Order of the Assembly do issue for a Return showing:

A copy of all reports prepared for or by the Government regarding various strategies for the privatization of Alberta Government Telephones, and all Government documents outlining the process which resulted in the decision to issue shares for AGT.

**356.** Mr. Mitchell to propose the following motion:

That an Order of the Assembly do issue for a Return showing: Any documents showing agreements between the Government of Alberta and Daishowa Canada Co. Ltd. under which the Government could be held liable if there were any delay in issuing the company licences to operate under the Clean Air and Clean Water Acts.

That an Order of the Assembly do issue for a Return showing: All reports, and analyses the Government has carried out regarding the impact of Bill 37, Alberta Government Telephones Reorganization Act, specifically sections 26, 27, 36.
