This being the First Day of the Fifth Session of the Fourteenth Legislative Assembly of the Province of Alberta, for the despatch of business pursuant to a Proclamation of His Honour the Honourable John Percy Page, Lieutenant Governor, dated the twelfth day of December, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-two, the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly read the Proclamation as follows:

Mr. Speaker entered the Assembly and took the Chair.

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor entered the Assembly and took his seat on the Throne.

His Honour then read the following Speech from the Throne :

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE  
LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

It is with pleasure that I welcome you to this Fifth Session of the Fourteenth Legislature of the Province of Alberta.

As the elected representatives of the citizens of this province, it is your responsibility to translate their collective will into beneficial legislation and exercise your best judgment to resolve these problems in the field of public affairs which affect the good and welfare of our province. Among these problems are certain social, economic and financial trends which will lead to serious disabilities in the future unless effective preventative measures are taken by all levels of government.

My government is pleased to report that agricultural conditions during 1962 were substantially better throughout most of the province than in 1961. Despite some drought areas in southern Alberta and some frost damage in northern communities, coarse grain yields were above average and wheat yields normal. Wheat acreage during the last twenty years has decreased by 3.6 million acres while the livestock population has increased from 1.3 million to 2.7 million head and now accounts for over 30% of total farm cash income. Recognizing the growing importance of our livestock industry, my government proposes to establish a Veterinary College in conjunction with the University of Alberta at Edmonton, if satisfactory arrangements for the sharing of costs can be made with the Government of Canada.

Your approval will be sought for certain programs which will be undertaken in co-operation with the Federal Government under the Agricultural Rehabilitation Development Act. These projects are designed to obtain more productive use of sub-

marginal lands and conserve water supplies and will include rural development programs which will provide new income opportunities.

A factual study of the factors involved in an over-all crop insurance plan is being carried out to determine its economic feasibility. You will be asked to approve expenditures for the construction of trunk drains in the St. Mary and Milk Rivers and Bow River Development projects and for the drainage of flooded lands in northern Alberta.

Having regard to the vast potential and growing importance of the northern areas of the province, legislation will be submitted for the establishment of a Northern Alberta Development Council, whose function will be to plan, promote co-ordinate and advise on practical measures to foster and advance northern development.

In the field of education, a new act to provide for accreditation of certain schools on an optional basis will be introduced and amendments to The School Act and The Teaching Profession Act will be submitted for your consideration.

You will be asked to approve increased appropriations for the Department of Education, which will include provision for the operation of the new Northern Alberta Institute of Technology at Edmonton and increased operational grants for the University of Alberta.

A large scale construction program will be continued at the University, both in Edmonton and Calgary, to provide the facilities necessary to accommodate the rapidly increasing student enrolment.

To further improve the province's extensive public health services, amendments will be introduced to The Health Unit Act and The Treatment Services Act. Amendments to the latter statute will enable my government, in co-operation with the medical profession, to develop and implement a program of voluntary prepaid medical services. This program will bring the cost of such services within the reach of those with limited financial resources while at the same time preserving the doctor-patient relationship necessary for a high standard of medical services.

A special committee within the Department of Public Health has been established to develop a program for those citizens who require a measure of nursing care but who are not eligible for admission to auxiliary or active treatment hospitals. It is my government's intention, in this field, to co-ordinate private and public nursing home facilities. A 100-bed hospital-school for multiple-handicapped children will be constructed in Edmonton as the first stage of a comprehensive program to meet the growing needs in this field. A new infirmary ward and a service building will be constructed at the Provincial Training School at Red Deer. Two new 125-bed dormitories will be provided at the Deerhome Institution and an administration and reception building will be completed at the Ponoka Mental Hospital.

Additional senior citizens' homes will be erected during the ensuing year at key centres where the need for such facilities has been established.

Initial steps will be taken during 1963 to establish a custodial farm and rehabilitation centre for alcoholics convicted of minor offences. This will enable the facilities of the Belmont Institution to be made available for a broader field of treatment and rehabilitation of alcoholics generally.

To improve the operation of our provincial penal institutions, special courses in training will be instituted for staff members and chaplain and counselling services will be provided for inmates.

To assist municipalities to meet the problems of local law enforcement, a provincial body of law enforcement personnel will be recruited and trained and made available, under contract, to local authorities desirous of availing themselves of this service. The nucleus of trained personnel not under contract to local authorities will replace the present Provincial Inspection Force which will be absorbed into the new provincewide organization.

A complete revision of The Town and Rural Planning Act will be submitted for your approval together with amendments to other statutes affecting municipal administration.

My government proposes to continue, during the ensuing year, a program of modern highway construction, including additional four-lane divided highways supplemented by a network of district and local roads.

Provincial Government grants to assist in the construction of district and local roads will be continued and some 200 bridge structures will be built on district roads during the year.

Amendments to the Alberta Insurance Act, The Vehicles and Highway Traffic Act and The Motor Vehicle Accident Indemnity Act will be placed before you which will increase, for financial responsibility purposes, the minimum limits of liability under automobile insurance policies for bodily injury or death of persons or damage to property in automobile accidents.

The growth of a vigorous forest protection and management program will be sustained throughout the ensuing year.

Continued support for the significant public interest in outdoor recreation will be supplied through further provincial park development. Grants for rural municipal park development will be made available to municipalities which have, thus far, not participated in this program.

Additional steps will be taken to ensure that the rights of surface owners, affected by the development of oil and gas resources, are fully protected. To this end, the Inspection Service of the Department of Mines and Minerals will be increased and legislation will be introduced to establish local surface reclama-

tion councils empowered to supervise the maintenance and reclamation of land used in connection with mines, quarries, oil and gas operations and pipelines.

A comprehensive review of the functions of the Oil and Gas Conservation Board has been carried out and certain amendments to the Act will be submitted for your approval.

Further extensions to the Alberta Government telephone system will be made during the ensuing year, including further conversions to dial operation and direct distance dialing service.

To afford citizens of Alberta greater protection against excessive interest rates and carrying charges when purchasing goods and services or borrowing from finance companies under deferred repayment plans, legislation will be introduced requiring full disclosure to the purchaser or borrower of the rate and total amount of interest and other service charges involved.

Having regard to public concern resulting from steadily rising levels of taxation and debt, my government proposes to invite representatives of local governments, school boards, business, agriculture and labor to join in a factual study of public expenditures and the manner in which they can be controlled and financed having regard to legitimate needs and the best interests of the people of the province as a whole.

The Public Accounts for the last fiscal year and the Estimates for the ensuing year will be submitted for your scrutiny and approval.

I leave you now to the business of this session confident that you will apply yourselves to your responsibilities in a manner that will ensure the best interests of all our people. I pray that Divine Providence will guide and direct your deliberations.

Mr. Gainer asked the following questions of which he had given notice and which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Holowach:

Q. 1. Mr. Huckvale reports deficits of Edmonton and Calgary Auditoriums. (Edmonton: \$167,991; Calgary: \$184,499).

What investigation has been made, if any, to detail and explain these losses, especially in view of the greatly increased labor costs?

A. 1. The general overall policy of the Government in the administration of public affairs and property has been to stress the necessity of thrift and economy. When the Auditoriums were built it was anticipated that they would not be self-supporting as they were established for the purpose of improving cultural development. Rental fees were established at a fairly nominal rate to encourage the activities of religious, fraternal, cultural and educational organizations and local amateur dramatic, musical and other productions. The two Auditoriums are open to the public approximately sixteen hours per day for seven days a week and it is a matter of interest that the attendance in 1962 was as follows:

This total attendance of 1,089,930 (patrons 1,036,751, visitors 53,179) represents a substantial increase in public attendance over previous years. It is considered of advantage to the people of Alberta and to the tourist trade of the Province that the Auditoriums should be kept open for visitors, notwithstanding that this entails additional costs which are reflected in the annual deficits for each Auditorium. The merit of this policy is indicated by the fact that many tributes are received and the Auditoriums have achieved world-wide renown.

Q. 2. What action is contemplated by the government to bring the receipts and expenditures nearer to a proper balance?

A. 2. As a result of a close examination of the situation made by the Auditoriums' Management Committee in 1961, effective July 1st of that year, rental fees, particularly in the case of commercial productions, were substantially increased. It is hoped that this will reduce the deficit. The Auditoriums' Management Committee, which meets monthly, and the Managers of the two Auditoriums give constant consideration to the matter of limiting expenditure of funds to essential requirements only.

Q. 3. What structural changes, if any, were made to either building which would increase expenditures, and why?

A. 3. There were no structural changes during the 1962-63 fiscal year.

Mr. Gainer asked the Government the following question of which he had given notice and which was answered by Hon. Mr. Aalborg:

Q. Regarding the proposed Reciprocal Pension Agreement between British Columbia and Alberta Teachers (A.T.A. issue of December, 1962): What progress has been made with this proposal, whereby Alberta teachers and British Columbia teachers may exchange positions and residence?—Alberta teachers and Ontario teachers?

A. No agreement has been proposed whereby teachers in Alberta, British Columbia and Ontario may exchange positions and residence as suggested in the question. However, the Boards that administer the Teacher Retirement Pension Plans of these three Provinces have recently concluded agreements which provide for portability of pensions for teachers who move from one of these Provinces to the other. The announcements which were made jointly by Alberta, British Columbia and Ontario when these agreements were concluded late last year read as follows:

"Teachers in British Columbia and Alberta will now be able to transfer from one province to the other without losing accrued pension benefits as a result of a reciprocal pension agreement recently completed.

"The agreement, the first of its kind at the provincial level will permit teachers to transfer and receive an aggregate allowance at retirement provided they qualify for a pension from the final province. Teachers transferring to or from Alberta must do so within a period of 15 months in order to satisfy eligibility requirements." (November 30, 1962).

"Teachers in Ontario and Alberta will now be able to move from one province to the other without losing accrued pension benefits as a result of a reciprocal pension agreement recently completed.

"This agreement, the second at the provincial level, will permit teachers to receive an aggregate allowance at retirement provided they qualify for a pension from the final province.

"Teachers transferring to or from Alberta must do so within a period of fifteen months in order to satisfy eligibility requirements." (December 7, 1962).

Mr. Gainer asked the Government the following questions of which he had given notice and which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Holowach:

Q. As to the Canadian Centennial, July 1, 1967:

1. What is being done provincially to mark this anniversary, and what program has been received as an outline for this event from the Federal Government?

A. 1. Alberta has been represented at all three meetings of the National Centennial Committee on the centennial convened in Ottawa by the Federal Government. These meetings were held on February 8, 1960, April 18, 1961, and October 11, 1961. On April 4, 1960, an Alberta Order in Council was passed formally appointing the Honourable A. R. Patrick, then Provincial Secretary, and Mr. G. R. A. Rice as Alberta representatives on this National Committee.

On September 29, 1961, the Federal National Centennial Act was passed providing for the establishment of the National Centennial Administration consisting of a Commissioner, a Deputy Commissioner, and not more than eight directors, to promote interest in and plan and implement programs and projects relating to the centennial of Confederation in Canada. This Act also made provision for the payment to the Administration of such amounts as from time to time are required for the purpose of making grants to Provinces and organizations for the observance of the centennial of Confederation.

On March 30, 1962, the Alberta Legislature passed The National Centennial Act (Alberta) to provide for planning Alberta's part in National Centennial celebrations in 1967. Tentative plans have been made for the appointment of an

Alberta Centennial Committee consisting of the Provincial Secretary and not more than four members and for the appointment of an advisory Committee to consider and advise on plans and programs relating to the celebration of the centennial throughout Alberta but no formal appointments have been made pending the establishment of the Federal National Centennial Administration and receipt and advice regarding the responsibilities the Federal Administration plans to assume with respect to the celebration of the centennial.

Q. 2. What suggestions, if any, have been made, and from whom, for a proper recognition of this important event?

A. 2. From a Provincial standpoint the Government has already announced a major project, namely, the establishment of a Provincial Museum and Archives. It is hoped that this project will be operational by the centennial year. The suggestion of the Calgary Winter Olympic Development Association that the 1968 Winter Olympics be held in Alberta in conjunction with the celebration of Canada's centennial has been energetically supported. The Alberta Government has undertaken to contribute substantially to the promotion and operation of the 1968 Winter Olympic Games in Alberta if the invitation to hold this event here is accepted. The Province has also undertaken to contribute to the construction of the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building to refurbish and preserve the Provincial Building in Charlottetown, which is the only building in Canada that had been used by the Fathers of Confederation.

Q. 3. What committees, if any, have been formed by the Provincial Government to research into the possibility of various activities throughout the province, cities, towns and villages?

A. 3. See answer to Question 1 above.

Q. 4. Are cities, towns and villages responsible for their own program of celebration? If so, what assistance from the Provincial or the Federal Government?

A. 4. Cities, towns and villages will naturally have a vital role to play as the success is related to actions taken by each community and every citizen. It is planned that assistance by way of advice and direction in organization and planning will be provided by the central committee. Decisions regarding financial assistance from the Provincial or the Federal Government of necessity have been delayed pending the establishment of the Federal Centennial administration.

Q. 5. Is the Federal-Provincial Committee at work now? If so, what has been done?

A. 5. The National Committee on the Centennial, which comprises representatives of the Federal and Provincial Governments, has not been convened by the Federal Government since the meeting of October 11, 1961, and no communication has been received from the Federal authorities with regard to co-ordination of Federal and Provincial centennial plans since January 12, 1962, other than a Press Release indicating that on January

25, 1963, the Federal Government had established the National Centennial Administration consisting of a Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner, and eight directors. We have not received any indication that Parliament has voted funds for the National Centennial.

Moved by Mr. Watkins, seconded by Mr. Fleming:

Whereas Alberta is the only Province in Canada (with exception of Prince Edward Island) which does not adopt some form of daylight saving regulation during the summer months, and

Whereas it is urged by many that the adoption of daylight saving during the summer months would be of great value to the health, well-being and enjoyment of a majority of the people of the Province,

Now be it resolved that the Government be urged to consider the taking of steps to ascertain the wishes of the people of Alberta on whether or not a measure to provide daylight saving regulations should be made a part of the Statutes of the Province in the future, and if a majority of them are in favor that the Government do consider the introduction of legislation to that end as soon as possible.

As reported in the "Calgary Herald" of June 26, 1962, Texas Oil reserves are more impressive if second recovery wells are added to primary reserves, which would represent a recovery of 300,000,000 barrels.

Q. 1. Is any such action being taken now for such recovery in Alberta?

A. 1. Yes. About one-quarter of the discovered oil reserves of Alberta are in pools now subject to secondary recovery or pressure maintenance operations.

Of the 3.6 billion barrels of proved recoverable crude oil reserves in Alberta, some 400,000,000 barrels is now attributable to gas and water injection schemes. It is expected that the portion of the reserves falling in this category will increase substantially in future years as evidence of the efficacy of schemes now in effect or soon to be commenced shows that the improved recoveries expected, but not yet counted in proved reserve estimates, will in fact be realized.

The following tabulation shows the distribution of the 3.6 billion barrels of remaining recoverable oil reserves in existing fields in Alberta, classified on the basis of susceptibility to pressure maintenance and maturity of the pressure maintenance operations:

One of the functions of the Oil and Gas Conservation Board is to ensure that the maximum possible recovery is obtained from the oil and gas pools in Alberta. In many types of oil pools it is possible, through the injection of water or gas or both of them, to more efficiently remove the oil from the porous rock than could be done by producing the oil by natural expulsive forces. The technique of improving the natural recovery processes is referred to as "secondary recovery" if it is applied to an oil pool from which virtually all of the recovery obtainable by natural forces has been obtained, and is called "pressure maintenance" when the natural forces are supplemented early in the life of the pool. Experience in the industry shows that usually it is not only cheaper but more efficient to supplement the natural forces early in the life of a pool, rather than to wait until after primary depletion has been completed. Since very few oil pools in Alberta have been depleted, almost all "secondary recovery" operations in the Province are more accurately referred to as pressure maintenance schemes.

Q. 2. If so, what companies are interested in this procedure now, if any?

A. 2. Almost all companies operating in Alberta are interested in, and are participating in, schemes for secondary recovery or pressure maintenance in oil pools.

Q. 3. Has the Government discussed this recovery operation with any of the Oil Companies. If so, with what results?

A. 3. The Oil and Gas Conservation Board is constantly studying and pursuing this matter with the companies. Some of the results referred to in Answer (1) above are as a result of Board action and all are with Board approval.

The Board is constantly reviewing the producing behaviour of the oil pools in Alberta to determine if artificial pressure maintenance or secondary recovery operations are economically feasible and most oil companies continually review their developed pools for recovery stimulation feasibility. As a result many



oil companies individually or on a co-operative basis have come forward over the past twelve years with proposals for water and gas injection schemes in many Alberta pools. Where the Board is satisfied that the scheme is the best possible scheme to put into effect, the Board has approved their proposals. In a few cases where the Board after a public hearing, concluded that pressure maintenance was feasible and no satisfactory scheme was proposed by the operators, the Board has ordered that pressure maintenance be put into effect and this has been done.

Therefore be it Resolved this Government give consideration to an interchange of views with the manufacturers of all types of tractor, regardless of point of manufacture, to find out what protection may be given to these tractors which would prevent them from turning on either side; namely, protection by an iron or steel bar arranged so that the tractor could not turn completely on its side, thus preventing accidents or possibly death, and after a thorough satisfactory settlement or agreement, implement such legislation as to make it mandatory that such protection be on every tractor sold within the Province.

“MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

“The Legislative Assembly of the Province of Alberta in Session assembled, approach Your Honour with sentiments of unfeigned loyalty and humbly beg to present for Your Honour’s acceptance a Bill intituled An Act for Granting to Her Majesty Certain Sums of Money for the Public Service for the Fiscal Years Ending Respectively the Thirty-first Day of March, 1962, the Thirty-first Day of March, 1963 and the Thirty-first Day of March, 1964.”

To this Bill the Royal Assent was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words:

“His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor doth thank Her Majesty’s dutiful and loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill in Her Majesty’s name.”

His Honour the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to deliver the following speech.

“MR. SPEAKER:

“Members of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta:

“In bringing to a conclusion this Fifth Session of the Fourteenth Legislative Assembly, I express my appreciation of the earnestness and thoroughness with which you have applied yourselves to your public duties.

“This Session was saddened by the passing of the Honourable Peter Dawson, Speaker of the Assembly for so many years. I join with the Honourable Members in extending my deepest sympathy to Mrs. Dawson and the members of the family.

“A number of important measures have come before you for decision. I have noted with much satisfaction the careful attention you have given to all of these, keeping steadfastly in mind the promotion of the welfare of the Province.

"I thank you for the provision you have made to meet the needs of the public service. The sums of money you have thus provided will be expended by my Ministers in accordance with the principles of efficient and economic administration.

"In relieving you from your duties, and declaring the Assembly prorogued. I pray that under Divine Providence our Province will make ever increasing progress in the attainment of general prosperity and happiness."

The Provincial Secretary then said:

"It is His Honour, the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor's Will and Pleasure that this Legislative Assembly be now prorogued, and this Legislative Assembly is accordingly prorogued."

His Honour, the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Assembly.
